HOUSEHOLD

NUT BREAD.

Four cups of flour, four rounding tea
spoons baking powder, salt, one fourth
cup sugar, one cup chopped walnuts,
one cup sweet milk, one egg. Sift dry
ingredients all together, add milk and
lastly, the beaten egg. Turn into bread
tin and bake one hour in a slow oven.
You can mould the dough into a loaf or
not, just as you chose. You may like
more sugar and less walnuts, or a few
raisins can be added. Fine for sand
wiches.

CRUMB PIE.

Three cups of flour, one cup of sugar,
one scant cup of butter and lard. Mix
into crumbs. Take out half cup crumbs
add one cup New Orleans molasses, one
teaspoon soda into one cup of hot water.
Stir and let foam into crumbs and mol-
asses. For pies divide into four med-
ium pie tins lined with crust, or bake
in dripping pan lined with paper.
Lastly, sprinkle half cup crumbs on top.
Bake in moderate oven.

Predict Union Of
Scotch Churches

Edinburgh, June 27.—The re-
cent general assemblies of the two
great factions of the Presbyterian
Churches in Scotland—the estab-
lished Church of Scotland and the
independant United Free Church
—will be followed during the year
by negotiations which are said to
be promising for a union of these
rival bodies, mending an historical
quarrel.

Various sects broke away from
the communion of the state church
as far back as the seventeenth cen-
tury, the secession being in pro-
test against the alleged low moral
state of the clergy and the political
system of the established church.
The established church scught to
mend matters in 1834 by adopting
the rule that no pastor should be
thrust upon a congregation against
the will of the people, but this was
annulled in 1843. Negotiations
for a union were renewed in 1907,
but progress was slow until this
year on account of the opposition
of a powerful minority on each
side. Even the former leaders of
the constitutionalists, however,
are now urging union.

A constitution was drawn up by
the recent assembly of the estab-
lished church which concedes the
spiritual independence of the free
church, but at the same time aims
to preserve the traditions of the
state church. It is this draft that
will be the basis of further nego-
tiations during the coming year, and
the willingness with which leaders
of both factions have taken up the
subject leads the pacificists to hope
for success.

The Strain on the Heart

All English authority, Dr.
Stickland Goodall, said in a re-
cent lecture that every time the
heart contracts its force would
raise a weight of 2 lb. to the
height of one foot, and it does this
from 70 to 140 times every min-
ute. Running to catch a train in-
creases the heart's work by 228
foot lbs a minute. Ascending a
staircase slowly increased the
heart's work by 112 foot lbs; as-
cending quickly by 152 foot lbs.
The enormous amount of total ex-
tra work done by the heart was
shown in the experiment of riding
a bicycle up hill, the gradient of
which was 1 in 10, and the length
2,904 feet. The ride occupied
3 1-2 minutes and the total extra
work done by the heart was no
less than 1 1-8 foot tons.

A rest of half an hour daily
would save in a year 219,000 foot
tons of work on the heart.

Sailing Vessel Thing of Past.

London, June 27.—The special sign
"s" before the names of steamers in
Lloyd's announcements has been dis-
continued as a frank and final recog-
nition of the fact that sailing vessels have
been nearly crowded off of the sea. In
Lloyd's register of a quarter of a cen-
tury ago, the sail ships led the steamers
by 22,402 to 10,260 in numbers, and
9,496,603 to 7,414,964 as to net tons.
This year's register shows that there
are now but 6,694 sailing vessels of
3,890,836 tons, while the steamers have
increased to 23,897 of 26,517,029 tons.
