The members of the A. M. E. church are arranging a bazaar to be held July 21st.

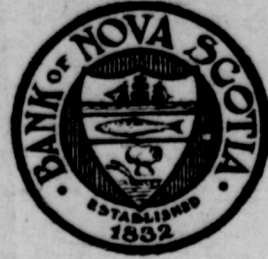
Presentation to Rev. George Ayers.
