**HOUSEHOLD**

**BAKED BROWN BREAD.**  
One-half cup sugar, 1-2 cup molasses,  
2 cups sour milk, 3 cups graham flour  
(sifted), 1 1-2 teaspoon soda, 1 tea-  
spoon salt, 1 cup flour.  
Mix dry ingredients, add molasses and  
milk. Beat thoroughly. This is an eco-  
nomical, delicious bread. It calls for  
no butter and eggs, which is a great  
factor these days.

Bake from forty to sixty minutes in  
slow oven.  
Raisins or nuts may be added to this  
mixture.  
For a coarse bread use unsifted flour,  
for a fine bread use sifted.

**Picnic Cake**

**SOFT FRUIT COOKIES.**  
One egg, 1 cup each of lard, sugar,  
sour milk, molasses and raisins, 1 tea-  
spoon each of soda, cinnamon and cloves  
1-4 teaspoon of salt and 4 cups of flour.  
Drop by spoonfuls on greased tins and  
bake in a quick oven.

**Cake Without Eggs.**

One and one-quarter cups of sugar,  
1 tablespoon of butter, 1 teaspoon of  
cinnamon, 1-4 teaspoon of cloves, a little  
nutmeg, 1 cup sour milk, 1 small tea-  
spoon of soda, 2 cups of flour, 1 cup of  
raisins and half cup of currants mixed  
in a little of the flour. Nut meats may  
also be added if liked. Bake in a loaf,  
leaving in a moderate oven for one  
hour.

**Chocolate Eggless Cake.**

Two cups of brown sugar, half cup of  
lard, 1 cup of thick sour milk, 1 tea-  
spoon soda, dissolved in the milk; 2 1-2  
cups of flour, 2 tablespoons of cocoa and  
1 teaspoon of vanilla. This recipe may  
be used for drop cakes, a nut  
meat being pressed in the top of each  
one before baking.

**TOMATO BISQUE.**

Tomato bisque is always acceptable,  
being enjoyed even by those who usual-  
ly do not care for soup. It is not a hit  
or miss potage by any means, and should  
be undertaken only when there is time  
to watch it carefully. Scald a quart of  
milk in a double boiler, meanwhile stew-  
ing one pint of peeled or canned toma-  
toes. Cream one tablespoonful of flour  
or cornstarch with a heaping table-  
spoonful of butter. Blend with a small  
quantity of cold milk, then with the  
hot, and stir until it thickens. Add one  
teaspoonful of salt, a little paprika or  
red pepper, and a tiny pinch of baking  
soda to counteract the acid of the toma-  
toes and keep the milk from curdling;  
stir in the hot tomatoes which have  
been rubbed thru a fine sieve. Serve  
at once preferably in cups with a desert  
spoonful of whipped cream on each.  
Make only the quantity of tomato bisque  
required for a single meal, as it cannot  
be warmed over without "breaking"  
the milk.

**TOMATOES.**

Select large firm tomatoes, take out  
part of the pulp and mix it with bread  
crumbs, boiled rice, mashed potato or  
ground meat. Season with salt, pepper  
and onion juice; put back in the shells,  
cover with coarse crumbs and bits of  
butter and bake.

For breakfast, cut tomatoes in thick  
slices, dredge with flour and fry in the  
pan in which the breakfast bacon has  
just been cooked, or in a mixture of  
lard and butter, or in drippings.

Another breakfast dish is prepared  
by breaking an egg into a scooped out  
tomato, dusting it with salt and pepper,  
and baking until the egg is firm.

From the tiny yellow tomatoes that  
ripen a little later on a delicious pre-  
serve may be made. Scald and remove  
skins, add an equal quantity of granu-  
lated sugar and let stand over night.  
Pour of the sirup next morning and  
boil until it begins to thicken, then add  
the tomatoes. Also an ounce of ginger  
and two sliced seeded lemons for each  
pound of fruit. Cook until clear and  
tender.

To bake potatoes quickly, clean and  
pour boiling water over them, and let  
stand on the stove five or ten minutes  
before putting them in the oven.

Iodine is a healing remedy for wounds

If eggs are to be stuffed, they must  
be put into cold water as soon as they  
are taken from the stove. This will  
keep the whites in better shape.

If salt fish is required for immediate  
use, it will freshen much more quickly  
if soaked in milk instead of water.  
Sour milk will answer as well as sweet.

An outdoor cupboard will be found  
useful and economical during the win-  
ter weather. It will do away with the  
necessity for ice for quite a long time.

Mix stove polish with equal parts of  
household ammonia and turpentine and  
apply to the coal stove. Rub off with a  
soft woolen cloth. It gives a high pol-  
ish.

If a gloss is desired on linen add a  
teaspoonful of salt to the starch when  
making.

To disguise the unpleasant taste of  
Epsom salts, drop in a little lemon juice.  
Then you will find the salt solution  
quite pleasant to take.

To insure a Yorkshire pudding always  
being light, it is a good plan to add a  
tablespoonful of cold water to the bat-  
ter just before placing it in the oven.

Powder the insides of new gloves to  
make them easier to slip on, and also,  
in the case of colored kid ones, to pre-  
vent the dye from staining the hands.

**Halifax Alarmed At Hindu  
Rumors**

Halifax, N. S. July 16.—Determined  
efforts are to be made immediately by  
the Halifax civic authorities to prevent  
further negotiations being carried on  
by an East Indian Colonization Com-  
pany to charter a steamer to bring a  
party of Hindu immigrants to Halifax.  
Steps were taken at the meeting of  
the Board of Control, yesterday, to  
bring the attention of the Nova Scotia  
government, the Prime Minister of  
Canada, the Minister of the Interior  
and the Minister of Labor the text of a  
despatch received from Vancouver  
stating that negotiations were under  
way by the Secretary of the America  
India Colonization Company to charter  
a steamer to bring 500 Hindus to Can-  
ada through the port of Halifax.

Mayor Bligh stated today that noth-  
ing would be left undone to emphati-  
cally show the secretary of this company,  
under whose auspices it was reported  
the Hindus were to come, that they  
were not wanted.
