Summer School of Science.

Wm. McIntosh, curator of the Natural History Society, St. John was in town on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week and delivered a series of lectures on "Insects Injurious and useful to farm crops."

R. Newton, Director of Agricultural Schools under the Agricultural Department, stationed at Woodstock, delivered on Monday and Tuesday, of this week a series of lectures on Field Crops and Soil Management. Both these series were most interesting and instructive and greatly appreciated by the classes.

The usual work of the school under the instructors will be proceeded with during the remainder of the week.

Miss Peacock is taking her classes to the Fisher Hospital for instructions in elementary work connected with nursing such as, making a bed containing a patient, bandaging, aid to the injured etc. Miss Lane, the matron, has very kindly consented to assist and to place at Miss Peacock's disposal facilities for carrying on her work.

H. B. Durost has a demonstration with bees this morning, out of doors, also has a section of a hive in a window of the Vocational School as an illustration of how bees will be introduced into the common schools.

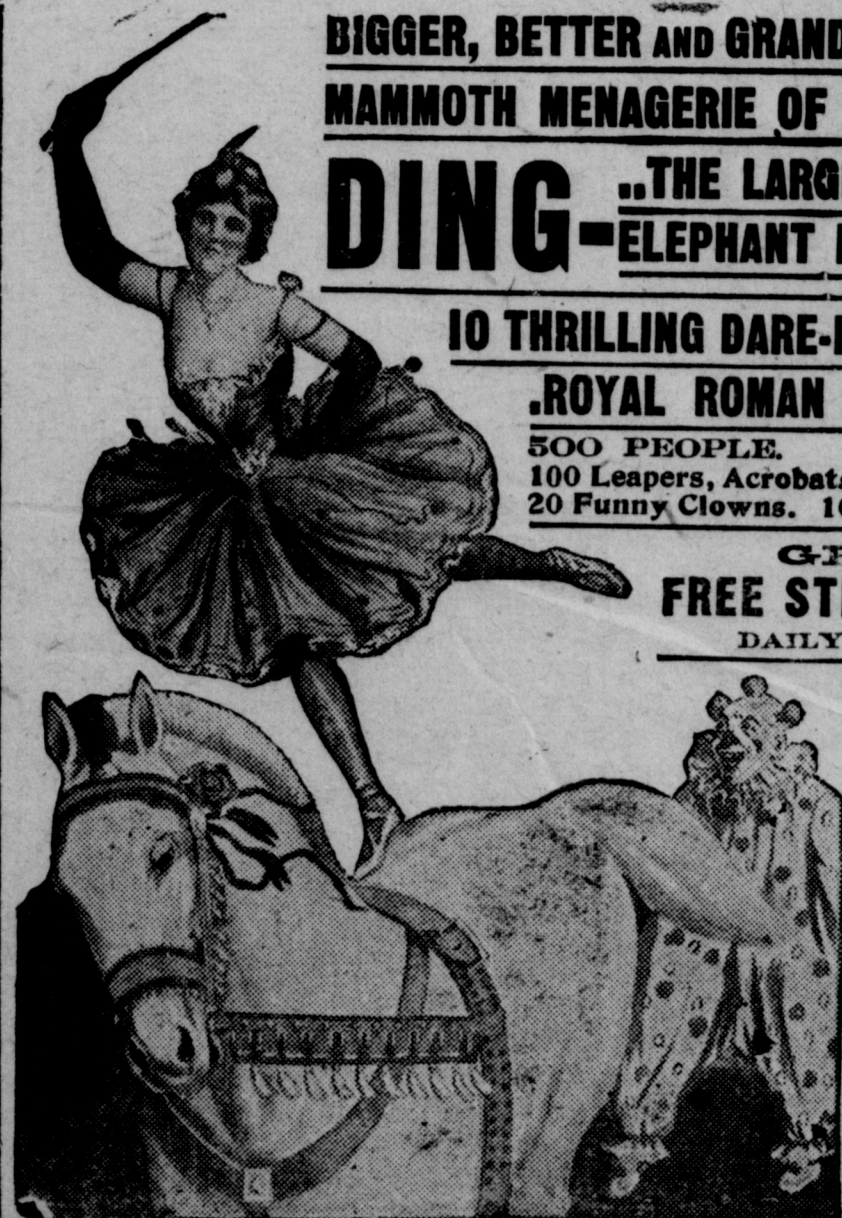
