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The department has taken steps to mark the place where the Empress of Ireland sank, by buoys, as a protection to other vessels. An official inquiry into the circumstances connected with the accident will be begun early next week.

Quebec, May 30.—The Storstad, followed by the wrecking steamer Lord Strathcona, passed Quebec at 1 o'clock this morning, on her way to Montreal, going slowly and under her own steam.

Quebec, May 30.—About 300 bodies from the wrecked Empress are on their way to Quebec on board the government steamer Lady Grey. Shed No. 27, on the Louise docks, is draped in black and preparations have been made by the local undertakers to receive the bodies of 150 lost passengers recovered at Rimouski.

Montreal, May 30.—Basing a most careful compilation on the official figures of the number of passengers and crew aboard the Empress as given out by the C. P. R. it would appear that out of the total of 1,367 passengers and crew aboard, 964 were lost and 403 saved. Of the saved, one-half were of the crew. 202 being saved out of a total of 413. The remaining 201 saved were made up of 150 from the steerage out of a total of 714, 21 from the second class out of a total of 153, and 30 of the first class out of a total of 87.
