HOUSEHOLD

Tempting Cakes.

WHITE CAKE.

One-half cupful of butter, one cup-
ful of sugar, two cupfuls of flour, two
level teaspoonfuls of baking powder,
one-half cupful of milk, white of three
eggs, one-half teaspoonful of salt and
one teaspoonful of vanilla. Sift the
flour and baking powder together,
cream the butter and sugar, add the
milk alternately with the flour. Beat
the egg whites to a stiff froth with the
salt and vanilla, add to the cake mix-
ture and beat a couple of minutes. Bake
slowly in loaf tins.

PLAIN FRUIT CAKE.

Cream one cupful of sugar with one-
half cupful of shortening, add two beat-
en eggs, a cupful of molasses and one
of sour milk. Dissolve a rounded tea-
spoonful of soda in a little water and
add to the mixture. Sift one teaspoon-
ful of cassia and one-half teaspoonful
each of cloves and nutmeg into two cup-
fuls of flour and stir into the other in-
gredients. Clean and dredge one-half
pound of currants, one pound of seeded
raisins, and one-quarter pound of chop-
ped citron. Add these alternately with
one cupful of flour to the batter. Bake
slowly in loaves. This cake keeps well.

COCOANUT FILLING.

Heat one cupful of milk in a double
boiler. Mix one tablespoonful of flour
with half a cupful of sugar and stir into
the hot milk. Beat one egg and add
slowly; then add half a cupful of shred-
ded cocoanut and stir until thick.
Spread between the layers of cake.

LIGHT FRUIT CAKE.

In a mixing bowl pour one cupful of
sour milk, add a teaspoonful of soda
and stir until it is light and foamy.
Then add one and a half cupfuls of sugar,
a third of a cupful of melted shortening
and two cupfuls of flour. Flavor with
one-half teaspoonful each of lemon and
vanilla extracts and a tablespoonful of
maple sugar. Dredge with flour one
cupful of seeded raisins, one-half cupful
of cleaned currants and a heaping
tablespoonful of chopped citron. Add
these to the cake and bake in a loaf,
slowly.

CHOCOLATE CAKE.

Cream one cupful of sugar and a
third of a cupful of butter together,
separate one egg and add the yolk to
the butter and sugar, melt one square
of chocolate and stir into the mixture.
Then add one-half cupful of sour milk
in which one-half teaspoonful of soda
has been dissolved. Beat the white of
egg to a stiff froth, add one-half tea-
spoonful of salt and one teaspoonful of
vanilla to the white of egg and add to
the cake mixture alternately with two
cupfuls of sifted flour.

WAR WILL LAST

EIGHTEEN MONTHS

London, Aug. 14—"Eighteen months,"
was the laconic reply of Lord Kitchen-
er, when asked to name the duration of
the war, at a dinner given at a mansion
in Belgrave Square.

Two hundred and thirty-nine years
ago, on August 10th, the foundations
were laid for the Greenwich Observa-
tory, which gives the world its standard
time. A year later it was completed
and approved by King Charles II. Its
erection marked a new epoch in the
world's navigation. Before its estab-
lishment a navigator's voyage was a
haphazard and exceedingly dangerous
undertaking. Today all the clocks of
the important countries of the world
are ticking in accordance to their dis-
tance from the Greenwich Observatory.
All the world's navigators are sailing
or steaming over the seven seas on
courses laid by Greenwich Observatory.

TETS FOR PAPER PULPS

New Methods to be tried at Govern-
ment Laboratories

Some native species of trees, little
used until now, will be tested at the
Forest Products Laboratories at Mc-
Gill University, Montreal, to see
whether they are suitable for pulp
and paper manufacture. For this pur-
pose the largest non-commercial paper
machine in the world will be installed.
The work is under the direction of
the Dominion Forestry Branch.

or paper will be kept. In this way
Canadian pulp and paper manufac-
turers by adopting the same methods
may achieve similar results.

Another very important feature of
the work of these laboratories will
be the investigating of various methods
of wood preservation. By such pro-
cesses the life of railway ties, posts,
poles and construction timber will be
in some cases doubled. It is expected
that it will be proved possible to use
many of the most common Canadian
woods for purposes to which, except
for their non-durability, they are ad-
mirably adapted. Birch, for instance,
if treated with creosote or zinc
chloride, or with a little of both of
these preservatives, makes an ideal
railway tie or paving block, being
cheap and also very resistant to the
wear and tear of traffic.
