SALAD DRESSING.

One tablespoonful of butter, one half
teaspoonful of salt, one teaspoonful
of mustard, one and a half tablespoon-
fuls of white sugar, one teaspoonful of
flour, one egg, three-quarters of a cup
of milk or cream and one-quarter of a
cup of vinegar. Mix the dry ingredi-
ents and the butter, add the egg slight-
ly beaten, and the milk. Stir over a
slow fire, adding the vinegar slowly.
Cook until it is like very thick cream.

MAYONNAISE DRESSING.

Into a chilled soup plate drop the yolk
of an egg drained free of all the white,
squeeze upon it a teaspoonful of lemon
juice and stir in with a silver fork until
well mixed. Now add gradually a few
drops of salad oil, stirring steadily. As
the dressing thickens, add the oil more
freely until you have used half a pint.
Season with a dash of paprika, a half
teaspoonful of salt, a salt-spoonful of
mustard and a generous tablespoonful
of vinegar.Cress minced as fine as possible and
mixed with mayonnaise makes a deli-
cious sandwich filling.

RED RASPBERRY PUDDING.

Two cups of flour, one-half cup of
sugar, two-thirds of a cup of milk or
water, one tablespoonful of butter, two
cups of berries, two teaspoonfuls of
baking powder, pinch of salt. Mix as
for biscuit dough, adding the berries the
last thing. Place in a buttered mold or
bucket, cover well and steam two hours.
If desired this pudding can be baked.
Serve with sweetened and crushed
berries that have been well heated just
before serving. This is a splendid way
to use soft or overripe berries.

RASPBERRY PIE.

Raspberry pie may be made of either
red or black berries. Care should be
taken to add either a spoonful of moist-
ened cornstarch or flour to prevent the
juice of the pies from running over.
Red raspberries and currants may be
mixed half and half and used as filling.
Two cups of raspberries to one cup of
currants and a cup of flour in which a
tablespoonful of flour has been mixed
are the proportions for one pie.

RASPBERRY TART.

Line a deep pie plate or muffin pans
with a thick, rich crust. Fill half way
full with berries and sprinkle sugar on
the top. Place a piece of crust on the
top but do not press the edges down.
Bake in a moderate oven.Make a custard by placing a cupful
of milk in a double boiler. When it
reaches the boiling point thicken with
a tablespoonful of cornstarch moistened
with a little cold milk and one table-
spoonful of sugar. Add the beaten
whites of two eggs. When the tarts
are baked carefully remove the top
crust and pour the mixture over the
fruit. Replace the crust and cool be-
fore serving.Liquors Banished From U S
NavyWashington, D. C. June 30.—The
famous order issued by Secretary Dan-
iels last April banishing all intoxicating
liquors from the United States navy
goes into effect tomorrow. The order
reads: "The use of introduction for
drinking purposes of alcoholic liquors
on board any naval vessel, or within
any yard or station, is strictly prohib-
ited, and commanding officers will be
held directly responsible for the en-
forcement of this order."The anti canteen laws for the army,
passed by Congress after a severe and
prolonged battle of the temperance
forces of the country, are less sweep-
ing than the prohibition which has now
been put into effect in the navy. The
order of Secretary Daniels abolishes the
officers' wine mess and absolutely for-
bids the "use or introduction" of al-
coholic liquors. In the army prohibi-
tion is restricted to "the sale of or deal-
ing in" intoxicating liquors. Army
officers under this law may maintain a
wine mess at their clubs.A bill to appropriate \$25,000 for the
proposed celebration of the anniversary
of the signing of the Treaty of Ghent
and 100 years of peace between English
speaking nations was defeated by a
vote of 185 to 52 in the U S House of
Representatives.The French military balloon Adj. Gen.
Vincennes piloted by George Joux and
carrying eight passengers, has estab-
lished a new world's record for con-

Militant "Furies" Re-
sume their Work.London, June 30.—After a brief lull
in the activities the militant "furies"
again aroused London today. A series
of mysterious fires in the south of Lon-
don, which did damage estimated at
\$100,000, was attributed to suffragettes
arson squads.Several business houses were burned
and two tenement houses were burned
families were made homeless.According to Scotland Yard, unmis-
takable evidence of incendiarism were
found.While the flames were burning their
way through south London, two wo-
men gained entrance to the official resi-
dence of Premier Asquith in Downing
Street. On the ruse of pretending to
have an appointment with the Premier
they were admitted by a servant. They
were no sooner inside than they demand-
ed an immediate interview to secure
"justice for women."When it was learned that they were
suffragettes the servants tried to object
them, and a violent scene ensued. Dur-
ing the fight one woman pulled a lock
and chain from her dress and attempted
to lock herself to the door. She failed
to do so. Policemen were summoned
and the suffragettes were hurried away
to jail, screaming that they were not
yet through with the Premier. At the
Bow street police station a dog whip
was found on one of the women. She
admitted that she had intended to lash
Premier Asquith if she had succeeded
in getting into his presence. The other
was indentified as "Miss Watson," a
militant with a long police record. They
were fined \$10.
