Rev. John B. Gough of Jack-sonville, has been registered to solemnize marriages.

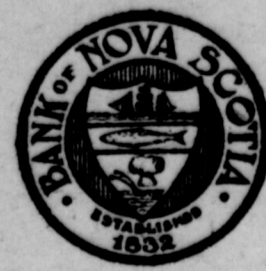
