Mr J B Daggett Going To England

FREDICTON, Oct., 24.—J. B. Daggett, secretary of the provincial agricultural department, will personally accompany the shipment of 100,000 bushels of New Brunswick potatoes, the gift of the province to Imperial government, to England, when the Battle Line steamer Sellasia sails from St. John next Monday night or Tuesday morning. This will insure proper supervision of the unloading and transfer of the shipment to the imperial authorities, and in view of the difficulties which have been experienced with some other shipments which have been made from Canada. It is felt well that a representative of the province should accompany the shipment personally. Mr. Daggett will also supervise the distribution of 300 barrels of New Brunswick apples, the gift of New Brunswick fruit growers, to hospitals in Great Britain for wounded sailors and soldiers.

During the past two years while he has been connected with the department of Agriculture. Mr. Daggett has not enjoyed a vacation, and he will be absent six or seven weeks, making a complete investigation of New Brunswick's immigration work in Great Britain before returning on one of the C. P. R. steamers before Christmas.

A. G. Turney, provincial horticulturist will act as deputy head of the department of agriculture during Mr. Daggett's absence.
