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HOUSEHOLD

BIRD'S NEST PUDDING.

Core and pare eight apples;
put into a deep, well-buttered
pudding dish; fill centres with
sugar and a little nutmeg; add
one pint of water and bake until
tender, but not soft. To two
cups of flour, add three teaspoon-
fuls of baking powder, one of
salt, one pint of milk and well
beaten yolks of four eggs; stir
and fold in the whites of four
eggs beaten dry. Pour over the
apples and bake one hour, in
moderate oven. Serve hot with
any pudding sauce.

SOUR MILK WAFFLES.

Materials—Egg, 1; sour milk,
1 cup flour, 1 cup butter, 1 table-
spoon soda, 1 teaspoon baking
powder, 1 1-2 teaspoons salt, 1-2
teaspoon.

Directions—Mix and sift flour,
soda and baking powder. Beat
egg thoroughly, add sour milk,
flour and salt. Beat thoroughly.
Cook on hot waffle iron and
serve hot with maple syrup.

CHEESE FONDU.

Materials—Breadcrumbs, 1 cup;
milk, 1 cup; grated cheese, 1
cup; melted butter, 1 tablespoon;
salt, 1-2 teaspoon; white pep-
per, 1-4 teaspoon; egg, 1.

Directions—Scald milk in
double boiler and add bread-
crumbs to it. Then add grated
cheese, melted butter and sea-
sonings. Cook in double boiler
until cheese is melted, add the
slightly beaten egg gradually.
Cook five minutes and serve on
dry toast.

RICE BAKED WITH CHEESE

Materials—Rice, 1 cup, grated
cheese, 1-2 pound; paprika,
milk, buttered bread or cracker
crumbs.

Directions—Cook the rice in
large amount of boiling salted
water (3 quarts water and 1
tablespoon salt). Add the rice
slowly to boiling water, so water
will not stop boiling and grains
fall to bottom of pan. When
tender, drain and cover bottom
of a buttered baking dish with a
layer of the rice; sprinkle with
cheese, grated or broken into
fine pieces, and a few grains red
pepper. Add milk to half fill
the dish, cover with crumbs and
bake until milk is absorbed and
crumbs a nice brown.

RICE AND NUT RABBIT.

Materials—Butter, 1 table-
spoon; flour, 1 tablespoon; milk,
1 cup; cheese 1-2 cup; cooked
rice, 1-2 cup; chopped pecan
meats, 1-3 cup; paprika, salt, hot
buttered toast.

Directions—Melt butter, add
flour, then milk gradually, stir-
ring constantly. When smooth
and creamy put in cheese cut in
small pieces, and stir until this
is blended, then add rice and
nuts. Season with salt and p-
rika and serve on toast. This a-
mount covers five pieces of toast.

The Turkish Torpedo.

The last infernal machine the
Kaiser has exploded in Turkey,
which, by dint of persistent bully-
ing, he has forced into the war. If
we are to believe various Turkish
communications to the Powers,
both at Constantinople and through
ambassadors, this breach of the

peace is against the will of the
Turkish Government. If so, the
Sublime Porte has for a good
while been of two minds—the
honest Turks, who did not want to
go to war, who are said to be the
majority, and a minority which
has been at the bidding, or, to be
plain, in the pay of the German.
Among these latter was the War
Minister. Through him Germany
has been pouring field officers and
great guns into Turkey, and has
taken complete command of the
Turkish armies, both in Europe
and in Asia, which it has disposed
with a view to the invasion of
Egypt, which Great Britain has
long been preparing for. The same
tricks have been played with Tur-
key's navy. The two German
cruisers which at the beginning of
the war were found in the Mediter-
ranean, made straight for the Bos-
phorus, where they were under-
stood to have taken shelter from
British and French ships. Then
the farce was gone through of sell-
ing them to the Turkish Govern-
ment, which we may be sure did
pay for them. They hoisted the
Turkish flag, but kept their crews
and equipment upon them. It is
said also that the "Hamidieh," the
only ship in the Turkish navy that
was worth anything in the late
war, was also under command of a
German. When the Germans
could not get the Turkish Govern-
ment to declare war, they, with
their allies in the Cabinet, took the
matter into their own hands, and
these vessels issued from the Bos-
phorus into the Black Sea, where
they assailed various Russian ports
and ships, and vessels of the Allied
Powers. This act created a state
of war from which the Turkish
Government was too weak to re-
cede. It placed the Turkish war
party on top, and it was found
that the Germans had their plans
well laid. They had been preach-
ing Mohammedan fanaticism among
the Arabs and getting them orga-
nized along the railway line that
runs between Damascus and Mecca,
to move on Egypt upon the old line
of march through Syria.—Mon-
treal Weekly Witness.
