HOUSEHOLD

FRUIT PANCAKES.

Pass through a sieve 1 cup of cooked
fruit—peaches, apricots or apples—add
1 egg, flavoring to suit fruit, 1 cup of
flour, 1 teaspoon of baking powder and
1 cup of fruit juice or water and sugar
to taste. Cook as pancakes and spread
with butter and sugar or with marmalade.
Roll up, sift sugar and lemon rind
over it and serve hot.

POTATO PANCAKES.

Grate on a coarse grater 2 large or 3
small potatoes. Add to them 2 lightly
beaten eggs, 1-2 teaspoon of salt, 1-3
teaspoon of pepper, enough flour to
make a light batter, and baking powder
in the proportion of 2 level teaspoons to
each cup of flour added. Drop the mix-
ture by spoonfuls into a frying pan con-
taining a little heated lard or drippings
and cook in the same manner as griddle
cakes. These are best with some dish
having gravy served with it, as, a Ger-
man potato roast or a cutlet.Light Rolls.—To two cupfuls of bread
flour add a quarter of a cup of yeast,
one and a half cupfuls of milk and
water mixed, one teaspoonful of salt,
two tablespoonfuls each of sugar and
butter; beat well and let stand until
light and full of bubbles. When ready
to knead, add a well beaten egg and
flour enough to make a dough stiff
enough to handle. Knead, using just
as little flour as possible until the dough
feels elastic. Let it rise again until
double its bulk, form into rolls, brush
with butter, and when light bake in a
hot oven.Caraway Sticks.—Use the dough
made for light rolls. Roll a small piece
in the hands until a roll three inches
long with tapering ends is formed;
score with a sharp knife, brush with
butter, sprinkle with salt and caraway
seeds, and when light bake in a brisk
oven. Keep well apart in the pan or
they will not have a nice crust.Raisin and nut bread may be pre-
pared by adding the desired amount of
fruit and nuts to the same dough used
for the rolls.Custard Cup Custards.—Heat a
quart of milk, beat four eggs and add
five tablespoonfuls of sugar; pour this
scalded milk slowly over the eggs,
beating all the time. Add five table-
spoonfuls of grated chocolate and pour
the custard into cups set in water;
steam on the top of the stove or bake
in the oven, always remembering to
keep plenty of water around the cups.
When the custard begins to set remove
the cups, set them into cold water,
which will drive the heat to the centre.CURRANT AND RASPBERRY
MARMALADE.To two pounds of crushed black or
red berries, add a teaspoonful of currant
juice, or of pieplant juice, the latter
made by baking the pieplant in a covered
dish with a very little water, and
then strained. Cook 20 minutes, stir-
ring constantly; add one and three-quar-
ter pounds of sugar, and cook 20 min-
utes. Nice to serve for lunch at pic-
nics.

At Vancouver upwards of 200 men of
the Sixth Regiment and the newly formed
Irish Fusiliers were called out Mon-
day night. They will go on Tuesday
morning, fully armed, on board the
Rainbow, which is due from Victoria.
More than 500 men should be on the
war vessel when she goes out to take
possession of the Komogata Maru. Un-
less the Hindus suffer a violent change
of mind during the night, they will
show a stubborn resistance, and a blood
fight may result.The number and net tonnage of British
vessels respecting which loss reports
were received at the British Board of
Trade during the month of June and the
number of lives lost are as follows: 22
sailing craft of net tonnage 2,194 20 hves
lost; 12 steamers of net tonnage 11,154,
1,038 hves lost, these including the Em-
press of Ireland figures. The total
losses of all types of vessels thus are 34
with a complete registered tonnage of
13,348 during the last month, the fatali-
ties being 1,058.India now has 315,156,396 people, and
where to put them all is coming to be
the trouble. Good government has
brought many blessings to the country,
but the population has increased corre-
spondingly, and the desire to emigrate
to other parts of the empire, which
Australia and Canada so oppose, is in-
spired by a real economic need.Fruit canning is developing famously
in South Africa, which has many ad-
vantages, including cheap sugar and
cheap native labor. As for the fruit,
some parts of South Africa, at a con-
siderable elevation, are said to be ex-
cellent for orchards. With develop-
ment of ocean refrigerator service there
should also be a growing market in the
northern hemisphere for fruit from the
Antipodes when our fruit is out of sea-
sons.**Fight For Equal Rights At
The Bar**Montreal, July 23.—Mrs. Annie Lang
slaff's fight to be admitted to the law
examinations, and, if successful there-
at, to be permitted to practice as a
lawyer, was advanced another step in
the Practice Court yesterday, when an
application for a writ of mandamus
was made before Mr. Justice Lane.
The mandamus is sought to compel
the Quebec bar to admit Mrs. Lang
slaff to equal privileges with the other
lawyers. The judge reserved his di-

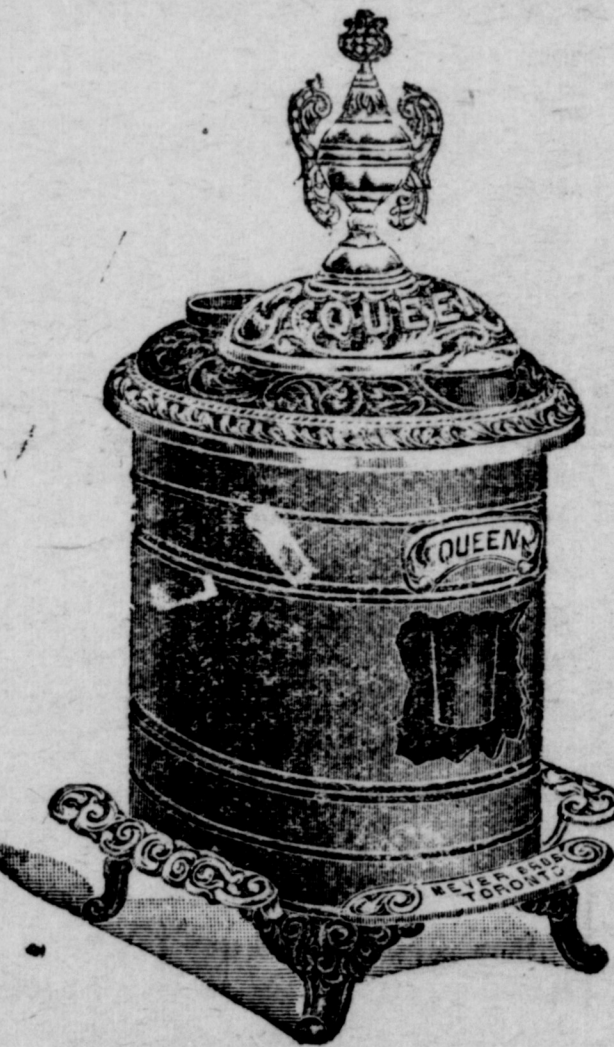
