A REMARKABLE PROPHECY.

The War of 1914 predicted in 1854—this prediction, made at Mayence, Announces the Fall of Germany and Austria Hungary in 1914.

There is in Germany a famous prophecy. It is called 'The Prophecy of Mayence,' and dated from 1854. It comprises eighteen verses of prediction, of which the first nine have been fulfilled in the most remarkable manner. Here are the verses:

1. When the little people of the Order shall feel themselves strong enough to shake off the yoke of their protector and when the barley is sprouting from the ears, their King William shall march against Austria.

2. They will have victory upon victory up to the gates of Vienna, but a word from the Great Emperor of the West shall make the heroes tremble on the field of victory, and the barley shall not be gathered in until he has signed the peace, shaken off the yoke and returned triumphantly to his country.

3. But at the gathering in of the fourth barley and that of the oats a dreadful sound of war shall call the harvesters to arms. A formidable army, followed by an extraordinary number of engines of war, that he alone could have invented shall start towards the West.

4. Woe to thee, great nation, woe to you who have abandoned the rights divine and human.

The God of battles has forsaken you; who will succor you?

5. Napoleon III., mocking his adversary at first, shall soon turn back towards the 'Chene-Populeux' where he shall disappear never to reappear.

6. In spite of the heroic resistance of France, a multitude of soldiers, blue, yellow, yellow and black, shall scatter themselves over a great part of France.

7. Alsace and Lorraine shall be carried away from France for a period and half a period.

8. The French shall only take courage again as against each other.

9. Woe to thee, great city, woe to thee city of vice! Fire and sword shall succeed fire and famine.

10. Courage, faithful souls, the reign of the dark shadow shall not have time to execute all its schemes.

11. But the time of mercy approaches. A prince of the nation is in your midst.

12. It is the man of salvation, the wise, the invincible, he shall count his enterprises by his victories.

13. He shall drive out the enemy of France, he shall march to victory on victory until the day of divine justice.

14. That day, he shall command seven kinds of soldiers, against three to the quarter of Bouleaux between Ham, Woerl and Paderborn.

15. Woe to thee, people of the North, thy seventh generation shall answer for all thy crimes. Woe to thee, people of the East, thou shalt spread afar the cries of affliction and innocent blood.

Never shall such an army be seen.

16. Three days the sun shall rise upwards on the heads of the combatants without being seen through the clouds of smoke.

Then the commander shall get the victory, two of his enemies shall be annihilated, the remainder of the three shall fly towards the extreme East.

18. William, the second of the name, shall be the last King of Prussia. He shall have no other successor save a King of Hanover, and a King of Saxony.

All the first part of this prophecy up to the ninth verse, inclusive, is verified by the war of 1866, then by that of 1870, and then by the Commune of 1871. Here are the last nine verses;

10. Courage French patriots, Germany cannot carry out its schemes of supremacy.

11. The time of retaliation approaches. The Tsar shall come in the midst of you to seal the alliance.

12. That is the man of salvation.

13. He shall chase the enemy of France, he shall conquer Germany until it is completely destroyed.

14. The last battle on the field of Bouleaux, near to Paderborn, in Westphalia, shall reunite seven allied peoples (French, Belgians, English, Dutch, Russians, Japanese and Servians) against three (Germans, Austrians and Hungarians.)

15. Woe to thee, Prussia, thy seventh generation shall answer for thy wars thou hast made upon all the people. (Seven generations make 30 years plus 7—210 years. The realm of Prussia dates from 1713. The seventh generation is, then, living between 1893 and 1923.) Woe to thee, Austria! Never such a battle shall have taken place.

16. It shall last three days in smoke of the conflagration.

17. Finally Prussia and Austria shall be annihilated. Hungary shall fly towards the extreme east (of Europe)

18. William II., shall be the last King of Prussia. Germany and Austria shall form three realms—Poland, Hanover and Saxony.

The British army is at present engaged in assisting the Prophecy of Mayence to a triumphal fulfilment.

The Czar's Soldiery.

Mr. Arthur Horsfield, chairman of the Baby Urban Council, Doncaster, who spent sixteen years in Russia as a mining engineer, is enthusiastic over the Czar's troops.

He states from his own knowledge of the facts that the Cossacks are the finest horsemen in the world; they are yeomen farmers, and every man is born a soldier.

Each Cossack supplies his own horse and outfit, the only thing provided by the Russian Government being the rifle. The men are very hardy, subsist largely on rye bread, and are on the army

Mr. Horsfield declares them to be the finest scouts in the world; men of tremendous endurance; akin to the Boers in their extreme mobility, and able to travel long distances. They will sleep anywhere, and in winter time use sheepskin as closing, the wool turned inwards.

The peasantry are another class. They each serve five years in the Russian army, and are very different to the brow-beaten, down-trodden serfs they are often pictured to be.

They are peasant proprietors, tilling their own holdings, of a contented nature, and regard the Czar with loyalty and reverence.

It is from their ranks that the foot regiments, artillery, and cavalry are drawn, and they make splendid soldiers—Mr. Horsfield's opinion.—English Paper.

DOES IT MEAN PEACEFUL HOME RULE?

The Home Rule question is settled—at least so thought every Englishman with whom I talked of the subject—and the settlement of that question is due to an Irishman—the Parliamentary leader, Mr. Redmond. When he made his speech bidding the British Government to withdraw all troops from Ireland if they needed them, and promising the Empire that the soil of Ireland would be defended by Nationalists and Ulsterites together, he swept away the one obstacle that had been standing in the way of a peaceful settlement of the Home Rule question—Conservative doubt of Irish loyalty.—Editorial corr. N. Y. Outlook.

The Only Basis of Lasting Peace.

Europe will not win peace by the domination of East over West or West over East, of Slav over Teuton or Teuton over Slav. It will win peace only when the various European races respect each other, recognize the truth that each race can learn from the neighboring races, and all the peoples—Russian, German, Austrian, Servian, Belgian, English, French—realize that they possess a common interest in the success of Europe over-wholly greater than any possible gain in the domination of one people over another.—New York Outlook.

A New View Of Russia.

Russia is in territory the greatest nation on earth. She holds half of Europe and a full third of Asia, all compact, with no outlying colonies. She owns well nigh

half of the world's North Temperate Zone, the most fruitful region for the production of an energetic and ruling population. Her people are of various races, tolerant of each other, good mixers; and another century is likely to see them stand well in the forefront of intellectual culture and political power.—New York Independent.

German Machine Was Well Prepared.

Describing the spectacular rush of the German armies across Belgium and northeastern France, and the plans laid therefor, a press correspondent says: "The German offensive plans were well laid. No army that ever took the field was so mobile. Thousands of army automobiles have been in use. Each regiment has its supply. The highways were mapped in advance. There was not a crossroads that was not known. Even the trifling brooks had been located. Nothing had been left to chance and the advance guard was accompanied by enormous automobiles filled with corps of sappers who carried bridge and road building materials."

Ammunition and Guns From U. S.

Toronto, Sept. 15.—That supplies of quick-firing guns, machine guns and ammunition for the Canadian artillery are coming from the United States is generally understood in well informed circles. Sixteen heavily armored cars, equipped with machine guns contributed by Clifford Sifton, former Minister of the Interior, who is well known in New York as an exhibitor at the horse shows can only be described as a purely United States equipment.

The British War office is urging the rapid movement to the continent of all the artillery from Canada, although it is understood that some of the Canadian expeditionary force's artillery, especially the quick-firers, have already been shipped direct to England from the Colt works in Hartford.

Military authorities some days ago, when it became known that there was a shortage of ammunition, announced that the steel works at Sydney, N. S., were turning out shells. This story is regarded as simply a "blind." There is no difficulty whatever in shipping in from Hartford and other places any quantity desired of artillery ammunition. Colt machine guns are shipped in harmless-looking trunks, which are constructed to carry them.

Such shipments destined for the Valcartier Camp, near Quebec, or for Ottawa; are made with the greatest expedition and without any inconvenience. The men who deliver them simply cheque them through as personal baggage. The Customs officials at the border or at the camp, if the stuff comes through in bond, never see the contents of the trunks.

The military authorities are planning a great coup. They plan to keep quiet the movement of 25,000 men from Valcartier to Quebec, sixteen miles, and their embarkation on ships there. Sailings of Canadian Atlantic steamships have been cancelled generally, in view of the movement of troops which is expected to begin this week.
