## Rice and Cheese.

Three cups of cooked rice, one cup of  
milk, one-half pound of cheese grated,  
a little salt and a little flour are requir-  
ed for this dish. Butter an earthen  
baking dish and fill with alternate lay-  
ers of rice and cheese sprinkled with  
salt. Pour in the milk to which the  
flour has been added, put on a top layer  
of cheese and bake until brown.

## California Cheese Fougue.

To one and one-half cups of bread-  
crumbs add an equal measure of milk  
and the same of grated cheese. Stir  
all together, add two eggs well beaten,  
a tablespoon of butter and a little salt.  
Cook until the cheese has melted, add  
enough cracker crumbs to thicken, and  
as soon as these are thoroughly heated  
remove from the stove and serve.

## Cinnamon Cake.

1 tablespoonful of butter; 1 cup of sug-  
ar, 1 egg, 1 cup of milk, 2 cups of  
flour, 2 teaspoonfuls of baking powder,  
2 teaspoonfuls cinnamon,Cream the butter and sugar together,  
beat the egg till light and add to the sug-  
ar; then add the milk, and the flour to  
which the baking powder and cinnamon  
have been added. Beat well, spread  
thin on baking tins and bake in a quick  
oven for twenty-five minutes. Serve  
while warm.

## Mixed Pickles.

To 1 quart of cucumbers add 1 quart  
green tomatoes, 1 quart onions, 1 head  
cauliflower, 1 stalk celery, 1 pepper, with  
seeds extracted. Cut these in small  
pieces, cover with one cup salt, let  
stand over night, drain off liquor, then  
scald, using half water and half vinegar.  
Put in cheesecloth 1 teaspoon each of  
ground ginger, allspice, clove, mace and  
cinnamon. Cover with vinegar and  
cook 20 minutes.

## Chili Sauce.

Here is a chili sauce which may be  
eaten raw or cooked. It will keep for  
weeks uncooked, and all winter if cook-  
ed and bottled. You will need eighteen  
ripe tomatoes, one large onion, three  
green peppers, all chopped fine. Put  
into kettle with one cup of sugar, two  
and a half cups of vinegar, two tea-  
spoonfuls of salt, one teaspoonful  
each of various spices. Mix well togeth-  
er. If you do not care for it uncooked  
let it boil about an hour.**Britain Cannot Lis-**  
**ten to Peace Talk**Only When German Militar-  
ism Is Utterly Crushed Will  
Peace Come.London, Sept. 14.—Until Prussian  
militarism is crushed for all time, both  
on land and sea, Britain will refuse to  
even consider propositions of peace.  
That was the emphatic position taken  
in London to-day. British officials  
are admittedly amazed by suggestions  
that the United States wants to pro-  
pose a compromise for the immediate  
ending of the war. It is felt that the  
position of the allies must be greatly  
misunderstood if it is believed that  
any peace proposal would even be re-  
ceived at this time.Were the war ended to-day, even  
though Belgium were indemnified and  
France received back Alsace-Lorraine,  
the great German fleet would remain  
as a menace to the peace of Europe.  
England is determined that this shall  
be the last war. Its officials, from the  
King down, insist that the real cause  
of the war was the German dream of  
world power. A compromise now, it  
is claimed, would mean that at a later  
date Germany would renew the at-  
tempt and this time the Allies might  
not be able to present their present  
unbroken front. So it is the intention  
of England to fight on until Germany  
is forced to consent to a peace that  
will make her a party for all time to  
treaties that she will be compelled to  
respect and not regard as "mere scraps  
of paper" to be disregarded at will.The Times to-day, commenting on  
the outlook declares that only peace  
concluded in Berlin and the dispersal  
of the German fleet, will be acceptable  
to the British people. It declares that  
any official who would consent to any  
lesser humiliation of Germany could  
not withstand the upheaval of popular  
disapproval.The agreement between the Allies  
that peace would only be concluded by  
an agreement satisfactory to all ended

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**Mrs. F. L. Mooers**for all time, officials say, the possibil-  
ity that Germany might be able to  
make individual terms which would  
permit her to retain her present status.  
France wants Alsace-Lorraine  
back and with it the enormous indem-  
nity that Bismarck wrung from her  
in 1871. But even though that were of-  
fered her by Germany right now, she  
could not accept as England and Rus-  
sia have tied her hands. The same is  
true of any suggestions that might be  
made acceptable to Russia or England.It is admitted that peace may be  
hastened by the defeat of the Germans  
in France and by the crushing of the  
Austrians by the Russians. There has  
been a strong under-current in Ger-  
many against the war. Only in Prus-  
sia was it popular with the people.  
The majority of the other German  
states had no liking for conflict, so  
far as the rank and file of the people  
was concerned. Now that Germany is  
on the defensive, that the attempt to  
take Paris has proven abortive, and  
above all, since the losses to the Father-  
land have been so enormous, there  
is real danger of a popular uprising  
which may change the present Ger-  
man system of government. The Ger-  
mans as a people seldom forgive mis-  
takes, and they are certain to con-  
sider a criminal mistake the inaugu-  
ration of a war that ranged almost  
the entire world against the German gov-  
ernment.Suggestions that the Kaiser may yet  
be forced to abdicate are made in cer-  
tain quarters usually familiar with  
what is going on in Germany. They  
are as yet only suggestions, but when  
the truth is known in Germany those  
making them here say they may be  
come realities. Meanwhile the British  
officials quietly, but emphatically, say  
peace suggestions at present are out  
of the question.
