The Rev. Frank Baird, on Thursday gave two lessons, one in the morning and one in the afternoon, to the students attending the Summer School of Science. The lessons were given in his garden and the subject was plant culture, particularly the culture of roses and sweet peas. He spoke on the preparation of the soil and on the choice of varieties of plants suited to our climate; how to care for them in the fall in order to bring them through the winter. Mr. Baird said he had proved that one could really grow roses of the best varieties in our climate. The students very greatly appreciated Mr. Baird's lesson. Mr. Baird has given the students permission to visit his garden at any time during his absence and use it as an observation garden. On Friday a number of the students visited the garden to make plans of it and get acquainted with the different plants.

Saint John Exhibition

The dates of the Saint John Exhibition are from September 5th., to 12th., and from reports received from Exhibition headquarters, this year's Fair promises to be especially interesting. All available space was spoken for and booked remarkably early and several applicants are now on the waiting list in the hope that readjustments can be made which will permit of giving them space. The demand has been so great that not one foot in the main buildings has been sold for the use of anything which is not a bone fide exhibit with the sole exception of food concessions. It is the intention this year to concentrate all the amusements in the Midway and before the Grandstand and to have these on an even better scale than heretofore, the main buildings being reserved so as to be truly representative of the manufacturers, Farmers and Business Houses of the Maritime Provinces. From present forecasts the Exhibition will this year reflect in a comprehensive manner the optimism and progressiveness that has taken such strong hold during the last few years of the people in these Provinces.

Saint John has a reputation to sustain with regard to its Exhibition and seems determined that the one to be held this year from September 5th. to 12th. will maintain this reputation.
