To Can Strawberries.

Crush two quarts of freshly-picked
berries and cook gently for twenty
minutes, then drain the juice from them
and put in to boil with a pound of heat-
ed sugar to each pint of juice. Skim
and boil until thick. Fill heated jars
with fresh, clean, whole berries, hulled;
pour over them the syrup, boiling hot,
till it covers them, then seal. Have
tops and rubbers sterilized in boiling
water.

Tasty Strawberry Shortcake.

Sift a heaping teaspoonful of baking
powder into a pint of flour, add a little
salt, rub into it a level tablespoonful of
butter, and mix with half a pint of milk
to a soft dough. Press it into a pan
with a spoon till it is about half an inch
thick. Bake for fifteen or twenty min-
utes. Chop and sweeten the straw-
berries, break the cake open and spread
it with butter, then pile the strawberries
on. Whipped cream looks better and
goes farther than the same amount of
plain cream, but a combination of both
is good.

To Can Young Beets.

Wash young beets, and leave on an
inch of the stems. Boil them till ten-
der, drop them a moment in cold water
until you can rub off the skin, pack them
tightly in jars, set these on a rack, fill
the jars to overflowing with boiling
water, and add a teaspoonful of salt to
each jar. Put on rubbers and covers
loosely, set the jars in a kettle of water
that partly covers them, and boil them
for three-quarters of an hour. Then
tighten the covers and let them cool in
the kettle. Carrots may be canned in
the same way.

Tapioca Jelly.

Cover one and a half cupsful of tap-
ioca with cold water and let it soak
overnight. Put into a saucepan with
two and a half cups of sugar and cook
until clear, then add the strained juice
of one orange, the strained juice of a
lemon and the syrup of a can of pine-
apple. Stiffly beat the whites of two
eggs and fold in. Serve cold with whip-
ped cream.

Chocolate Coffee Cake.

Mix the ingredients thus:—one quar-
ter cup butter and one cup sugar, to
this add one egg well beaten, stirring
slightly, then a quarter cup of milk,
and quarter cup grated chocolate dissolv-
ed in half a cup of coffee. Mix three
teaspoons baking powder in two heap-
ing cups flour, and add to the above
mixture. Stir all thoroughly, and bake.

This Week Cool Fol-
lowed By A Very
Warm Spell

Washington, June 3.—The last bul-
letin gave forecasts of a disturbance
to cross the continent June 2 to 4, a
warm wave June 1 to 5, a cool wave
June 4 to 8. The first week in June
will be cooler than usual and rainfall
generally below normal. Indications
are that more rain will fall near the
Atlantic coasts in June than in the in-
terior of the country, but even there
the rainfall will be deficient with a
few exceptions.

The Atlantic coast line mentioned is
many thousands of miles in length,
reaching from Vera Cruz, Mexico, to
Labrador, Canada. The location of the
evaporation sections are on the east
side of the Atlantic and must be carried
to these coasts by the trade winds of
the Atlantic and therefore most of the
moisture will have been precipitated be-
fore reaching this continent.

The next disturbance will reach the
Pacific coast about June 8, cross the
Pacific slope by close of June 9, great
central valleys June 10 to 12, eastern
sections June 13. A warm wave will
cross Pacific slope about June 8, great
central valleys June 10, eastern section
June 12. A cool wave will cross Pacific
slope about June 11, great central valleys
June 13, eastern sections June 15.

This will bring a great hot wave and
cause a severe drouth in many parts of
the central portions of the great central
valleys. As the cool wave comes in
showers and thunder storms are expect-
ed but these will be principally near the
Atlantic and Gulf coasts.

While June is not expected to be a
very great storm month we must hang
out our danger signals for the week
centering on June 20. Better cut this
week out of your pleasure trips on the
water. The moon Venus, Mars, the
earth and Saturn will all occupy posi-
tions relative to the Sun and to each
