The session was then given to the subject of "Arithmetic" by Mr. Rideout and President Squires. The session then adjourned to the Vocational School where the visiting teachers were shown the work done in the treatment there.

## FORTH SESSION.

The fourth session was called to order at 2 p.m. After roll call the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The president introduced Mr. O'Brien who gave a very helpful address on arithmetic showing how he would teach different phases of that subject. Addition by teaching combinations rather than by tables, the first steps in reasoning, different measurements, fractions and decimals were dealt with in turn, in a very interesting manner.

The president on behalf of the School Board extended an invitation to the institute to meet next year in the Fisher Memorial School. Miss Fraser invited the teachers to Grant Falls. By a standing vote it was decided to accept Miss Fraser's invitation to Grant Falls.

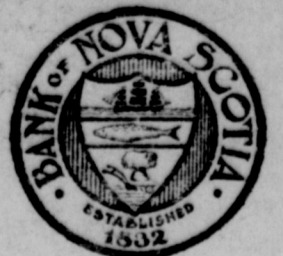
