## "THE TEA SITUATION."

The "Canadian Grocer" says—

"TEA—The reported lifting of  
the Old Country embargo on tea is the  
chief feature in this market. While  
this has created an easier felling here,  
yet it should be remembered that this  
tea in London, England, will not arrive  
for four or five weeks at least. From a  
week ago the situation in package teas  
remains same generally as week ago  
except that the Salada Tea Co., have  
dropped prices five cents per pound.

Tea men state that no auctions are  
being held in Colombo or Calcutta, and  
no tea is going forward to London. It  
is stated that there are only seventy  
million pounds of Tea in England, which  
is only enough to last six weeks. If no  
new tea comes forward in the mean-  
time the embargo might be replaced at  
any time, it is thought.

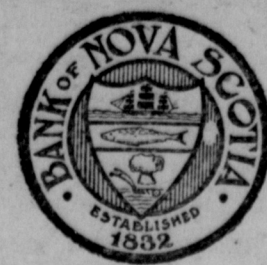

## German Spies Die By Scores.

Paris, Sept. 6.—A British officer who  
arrived in Paris from the front, says  
the number and persistence of German  
spies is amazing. A screen of hundreds  
is thrown out in advance of their ar-  
mies. Most of them are captured, but  
some no doubt, succeed in getting back  
with valuable reports.

British troops find them everywhere—  
in villages and towns which they oc-  
cupy; in woods and fields and on roads,  
marching among British soldiers.

They almost invariably are in British  
uniforms, which have every appearance  
of being kept in stock by the Germans.  
They can seldom speak any English or  
even French, and allow themselves to  
be captured without the slightest at-  
tempt to resist or defend their identity.

They are shot without exception, but  
their loss does not affect the contin-  
uance of the system in the least. Ten  
may be found in a village and shot one  
day, and there will be twenty there on  
the next.
