War Tax on Patent Medicines and Toilet Articles.

The stamp tax which came into effect the 15th inst, applies to all patent medicines, used internally or applied externally, and all toilet articles applied to the skin, hair or used in the mouth.

The dealer is required, before making a sale of any of the above articles to affix a stamp to same of the following value on all articles which sell at 25 cents or less, one cent,

- from 25 to 50's.....2 cents
" 50 to 75's.....3 cents
" 75 to \$1.00.....4 cents
and each additional 25c, 1 cent.

This tax is to be collected from the person buying the articles and the proceeds of the same are remitted to the Federal government.

The Act does not apply to drugs, prescriptions, or any preparation that is not patented.

The penalty for not affixing the proper stamps to any of the above named articles is not less than \$50 and not more than \$250.
