Board of Trade.

The Board of trade held a meeting in the Council Chamber Thursday evening last. The president, E. W. Jarvis, and secretary A. D. Holyoke, were present, as well as a fairly good attendance of members.

The following resolution, moved by T. C. L. Ketchum, seconded by A. D. Holyoke, was unanimously passed:

The members of the Woodstock Board of Trade here with assembled to express and record their deep sense of the loss the board has sustained in the death of J. T. Allan Dibblee, Esquire, which occurred the last day of January past.

One of the original members of the Board in 1894, Mr. Dibblee continued his interest and support from the time of organization, a record of the attendance of members during the years that have elapsed, showing that he missed very few meetings none that he was able to attend, and in this practical expression of his belief in its utility, he far surpassed any other member. He was an uncompromising supporter of the Board, as a useful and practical vehicle for conveying the business sentiment of the community, and a warm defender against charges that was biased, unrepresentative and ineffective. Not one member did more than he for the town through the Board. He was incessantly fighting the Railway Company in its discrimination against the town in the matter of freight rates, and in several instances through his exertions better terms were secured. For many years president, he filled the office with ability and with zeal in the town's interests. At the time of the agitation for the building of the Valley Road, he was most active, and all will remember the part he took in leading the delegation from Woodstock to Ottawa and Fredericton.

In passing this Resolution, it is not done as a mere formal proceeding but with a sincere feeling that a loss has been met in Mr. Dibblee's death that can scarcely be filled. The younger men of this town are especially urged to emulate the example he set in his earnest devotion to the public life of the community in which he lived, and in the unbounded faith he had in the future of this town and county.

T. C. L. Ketchum was elected a member of the board in place of the late J. T. A. Dibblee.

The matter of dairy record centres for the province of New Brunswick was discussed and the following resolutions passed:

Whereas the county of Carleton is one of the richest agricultural sections of eastern Canada; and

Whereas cattle raising and dairying, which at one time was the most important factor of the farms in the county, has been gradually decreasing owing largely to the lack of scientific knowledge of production; and

Whereas we believe that with the application of up-to-date methods the farmers of Carleton county would return to dairying and cattle raising to a greater extent than ever.

Therefore resolved that in the opinion of this Board of Trade it is very desirable that a Dairy Record Centre be established at Woodstock this year.

PACKED COPPER LABELLED SUGAR.

Copenhagen (via London), Feb 15.—A large shipment of copper, packed in casks which were labelled "sugar," and put aboard the steamship Carmen, was seized here today. The copper was consigned to a German firm. The shipper and the captain of the vessel were arrested.
