There entered into rest at noon on May 5th, Mary, relict of the late John Edgar, after a lingering illness which she bore with Christian fortitude. The deceased, who was eighty-five years of age, was of a particularly loving and cheerful disposition, and had many friends who will regret to learn of her death. Before her marriage she was Miss Mary McGrath, daughter of the late Michael and Elizabeth McGrath, of Jacksonville. She was married in 1849, living in Woodstock until 1873 when she removed with her husband and family to Three Brooks, N. B., where she has since lived. Of a large family four sons survive, John, Carter, Percy and Arthur, all of Three Brooks, N. B. Besides her sons she leaves twenty grandchildren and seven great grandchildren to mourn their loss.
