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Recruiting General Campaign

On Sunday next a general recruiting campaign for the 55th N. B. Regiment will be inaugurated throughout the province. Lieutenant Governor Wood on the suggestion of Premier Clarke, will issue a proclamatiou setting aside May 23rd as Patriotic Sunday, on which day it is desired that special services be held in all New Brunswick churches dealing with this phase of New Brunswick's participation in the

Commencing on Monday morning the officers in charge of the regiment will commence an energetic recruiting campaign. It is their intention to organize local committees in all the more important centres. which committees will under one general plan arrange for series of meetings and carry on whatever other activities may be considered advisable. Addresses will be given on the need of men, and recruiting officers will tour the province in so far as is possible, taking the names of all prospective recruits. These parties will supplement the work which is now being performed by the permanent recruiting officers. The men will undergo a preliminary examination at the organization centres and there be enrolled. They will be given transportation to Sussex, at which camp they will report as promptly as possible for final medical examination and be placed on the regular strength of the regiment. Pay begins from the time of enrollment.

The 55th Regiment so far has secured a total of about seven hundred and fifty men, of whom forty bave been transferred to the 26th to complete its strength, and a further detschment of took Junction. two hundred and fifty have been selected for immediate overseas service. This leaves between six and seven hundred on Monday. men still to be secured to bring the 55th to full war strength, and it is with s view of obtaining these six or seven hundred that the present campaign is launched.

In view of the success which attended the campaign in favour of the 26th N. B. Regiment conducted some few months ago, it is anticipated that the present movement will result in an equally gratifying measure of success.

Ivor H Murray

Mr. Fred C. Murray of the Canadian Bank of Commerce staff, Moncton received a letter signed by a signaller of the 4th Battalion, First Brigade, First Canadian Division. British Expeditionary Force, announcing that his brother Private Iver H. Murray, had been kil! ed in action. The letter reads as follows:-April 19, 1915.

Mr. F. C. Murray, Moncton, N. B.

Dear Mr. Murray.

I deeply regret to have to inform you of the death of my chum Ivor Murray, which took place last night. He was killed by a shell wnich fell on his dugout penetrated the roof and exploded in the ground just behind it. He was not mutilated, although death from the shock must have been instantan eous. We will miss him very much. He was a good man and a good soldier, always doing his duty, generally a little bit more than his duty. Only yesterday he worked an extra part of the day on the telephone so that a tired com rade might rest, which was the kind of thing he was always doing. He was always unselfish and has led a good recovered from a recent surgical operclean life with us since enlistment. had known him for some time in Brant ford before the war.

W. E. HART. Signaller 4th Battalion, Can. Div. Mr. lvor Murray was the son of Mr. J. A'bert Murray, former I. C. R. Station Agent at Shediac. He enlisted with the first contingent at Paris, Ont., being a member of the Bank of Montreal staff at that place. For a time he was stationed in Moncton in the Bank of Montreal. He was 25 years of age. His brother Fred Murray is at present Accountant in the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Moncton.

The family of the deceased soldier. last heard from him in a letter written April 19th. It is presumed he took part and met death in some of the sevare fighting, in which the Canadians were engaged at Langemarck, Ypres and some adjacent points.
