HOUSEHOLD

FISH CHOWDER.

Materials—Three pounds of
fresh haddock, 1 cupful diced
salt pork, 2 small onions, 4
cupfuls sliced potatoes, 2 teaspoon-
fuls salt, 1 quart milk.Directions—Skin the fish and
remove the flesh in two long
strips. Cut these in 2-inch pieces.
Simmer the head, body, bones
and trimmings for twenty min-
utes in water to cover; then
drain. Fry the fat slowly out
of the salt pork and cook the
onion in it till yellow; then add
both to the fish, together with
the fish stock. Parboil the po-
tatoes for five minutes, add them
to the fish mixture; season and
simmer till the potatoes are ten-
der; then add the milk, which
should be scalded, and garnish
with split and buttered cakes. If
a thicker consistency is desired,
add 2 tablespoonfuls of flour
creamed together with 3 table-
spoonfuls of butter, or use a
cupful of stale breadcrumbs.

FRUIT WHIP.

The combination of fruit juice
with whites of eggs makes a
dainty fruit sauce for puddings
not otherwise specially attrac-
tive, like plain rice or cornstarch
pudding. Or it makes a dainty
for invalids. Cranberry juice
whipped up with the whites will
make an attractive color, or you
can put in a glass of currant
jelly, or even the harder apple
or quince jelly if you only beat
it hard enough. It will blend
better if the jelly is warmed
first. When you have used yolks
for anything, beat up the whites
with any fruit juice you have to
taste.

EGG JELLY.

Required. Two lemons, 4oz
loaf sugar, two eggs, 1/2oz gela-
tine. Peel the lemons thinly,
cut each in half, and squeeze
out the juice. Put the gelatine
into a saucepan, add to it the
sugar and lemon rind, strain the
lemon juice, and make it up to
one pint of water. Beat up the
eggs, add them to the lemon
juice, etc.; stir all over a very
moderate fire until the gelatine
is melted; then strain and fill
several small jelly moulds. When
set turn out the jellies, dish up
and serve.

LEMON CREAM.

Four yolks of eggs beaten
with five tablespoons of sugar,
the juice of one lemon, three
tablespoons hot water. Cook in a
double boiler until like soft
custard. Fold in whites beaten
with two tablespoons of sugar.

FROZEN CUSTARD.

Beat to a cream the yolks of
four eggs; pour into them two
quarts of scalding hot milk; add
two cups of sugar, and return
to the fire. Stir and cook just a
minute. Add a quarter of an
ounce of gelatine that has been
soaked half an hour in half a cup
of cold water. Strain and flavor,
and when perfectly cold, freeze
in usual manner and serve same
as ice cream, garnishing with
fresh ripe fruit.You Might try Some of These

solution of alum.When Chopping Parsley.—You
can chop parsley much finer and
more easily if you sprinkle a little
salt over it.To Remove Ink Spots.—Soak
the spots in strong salt water, rinse
with ammonia and repeat the pro-
cess if necessary. The salt changes
the nitrate of silver in the ink
into chloride of silver, and the am-
monia dissolves the chloride, and
hence removes the stains.To Polish a Range.—First clean-
se all grease from your range and
give it a good coat of blacking,
then saturate a cloth with turpen-
tine, rub on the dull blacking
and polish with a piece of news-
paper or a flannel cloth. Have
your range cold before you use the
turpentine.To Remove White Spots.—The
white spots which hot dishes often
leave on tables and other wooden
surfaces can be removed by apply-
ing a mixture composed of equal
parts of alcohol, olive oil and pure
cider vinegar. Shake well before
using. Rub well with a woolen
cloth and polish with another soft
woolen cloth.To Brighten Shabby Carpet.—
Cut an ounce of yellow soap into
small squares and make into a
lather with a pint of boiling water.
Add to this a quart of water and
one ounce of borax and bring to a
boil. When quite cold add an
ounce each of alcohol and ammonia
and 1 1/2 ounce of glycerine. Wipe
over a small portion of carpet at a
time with this mixture rubbing
vigorously with a clean flannel
which should be turned as it gets
soiled.Removing Labels from Bottles.
—Wet the face of the label with
water and hold it for an instant
over any convenient flame. The
steam formed penetrates the label
at once and softens the paste.Two German Poles on Trial

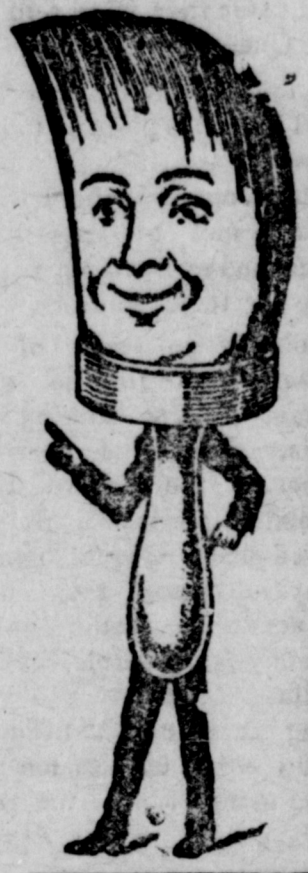
