POTATO SOUFFLE.

Mash half a pound of potatoes,
add salt and pepper and a beat-
en egg, also one ounce of butter
and a tablespoonful of milk and
chopped parsley. Place the mix-
ture in a greased basin and
steam for an hour. Turn out and
serve hot.

SCALLOPED ONIONS.

Boil three large onions until
just tender, drain them and slice
them thinly in rings. Butter
thickly some scallop shells and
sprinkle with breadcrumbs. Place
a layer of sliced onion in the
shells sprinkle with crumbs, and
so on until the shells are well
piled up, the last layer to be
breadcrumbs. On these place
some pieces of butter. Put into
the oven for about 20 minutes
until nicely browned on top.
Serve hot in the shells.

CARROTS AND TURNIPS IN
WHITE SAUCE.

Cut two carrots into small
strips and a turnip into small
cubes. Boil these together for 15
to 20 minutes in salted water.
Drain and stir them into a half-
pint of white sauce. Dish in a
hot tureen, and sprinkle with a
little chopped parsley.

DELICIOUS SALT PORK.

Salt pork is much nicer tak-
ed in the oven than fried on top
of the stove. Slice rather thin,
soak in sour milk an hour or so,
and then roll in flour or corn
meal. Put in shallow baking pan,
set on the rack in the oven and
bake a nice brown. It will be
very crisp and appetizing. It is
better soaked in milk than water.

PEARL BARLEY.

Pearl barley is one of the
cereals that is not much used ex-
cept for thickening soups, but
if used with apples and baked it
makes a most nourishing pud-
ding. Wash half a cup of pearl
barley and leave it in water
overnight. In the morning put
it in a saucer on the back of
the stove with a pint of water
and a slice of lemon peel and
let it simmer until within an
hour of supper time, for this

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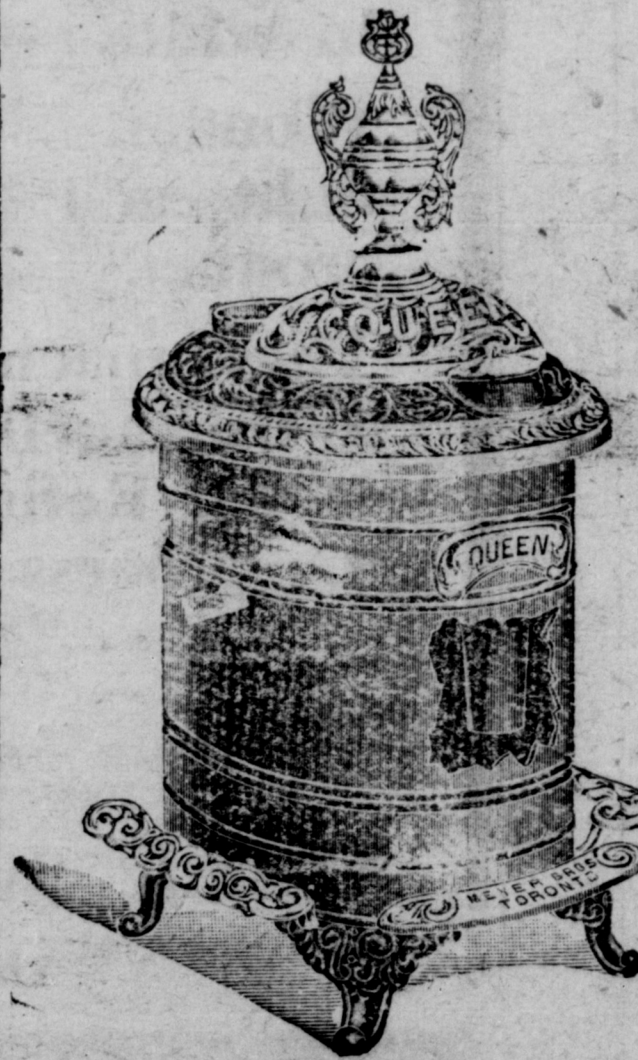
