WAR REVENUE ACT.

The War Revenue Act comes into force on Thursday morning. War Tax stamps will be on sale at the Post Office. On letters the usual two cent stamp will be used with the one cent War Tax stamp.

The Library Commission met in monthly session on Monday evening, April 5th. Commissioners Carleton, Dibblee, Garden and Baird being present. The report of the Librarian showed 2652 books distributed during March, 361 readers using the rooms, and 98 new patrons, making the number of patrons now 875.

It was agreed to extend the thanks of the Commission to John A. Lindsay, Esq., and to Miss Martin, assistant Librarian of the St. John Public Library, for some 500 government documents.

It was further resolved to ask the citizens through local press, to send to the Library, Magazines, which might be placed in the mens' Reading Room for use of the soldiers at present in town.
