



Swiss Hotel Industry Hard Hit by War

The Swiss hotel industry has been hard hit by the war, and in Switzerland, because of the tourist traffic, hotel keeping ranks third among the industries of the country. Swiss hotel keepers do not anticipate any profits for the coming summer and feel that they will be lucky if receipts are sufficient to keep their properties from bankruptcy. A prominent Swiss hotel manager has told the Ritz manager it is probable the Government will do something for the hotel men, by way of a measure permitting them to borrow money on their furniture and on the good will of their trade.

Found Sentry Box of Romans

In the course of the renovation by the British office of works of the Roman Pharos near Dover Castle the removal of some stonework probably erected during the last two or three centuries has opened out a roman sentry box inside the ancient tower. These renovations have also been extended to the Colton Tower, one of the Norman defences of the castle, and the removal of stonework has disclosed an entrance doorway to the tower and an oven where the troops in Norman days did their cooking.

Protest Against Turkish Massacres

Washington, April 27—The state department late today made representations to the Turkish government regarding the reported massacre of Armenians in Turkey, urging that steps be taken for the prevention of further outrages. Secretary Bryan acted upon the request of the Russian government, submitted through Mr. Bakhmeteff.

Free Trips to England For Skilled Workmen.

London, April 27—Free trips to England and return are foreshadowed for skilled workmen in the United States and in the colonies of Great Britain, who are willing to fill the shortage among the armament firms in the British Isles. Francis D. Ackland, financial secretary of the treasury, announced in the house of commons this afternoon that the government was

taking steps to obtain such help in the production of munitions of war. Free transportation would be arranged, he said, if suitable labor were discovered without displacing the men already effectively engaged in those countries.

OLD BRITISH FIRMS.

Two tradesmen, or rather two firms mentioned by Pepys still exist—Hill, the Bond street (London) violin maker and Dan Rawlinson of Fenchurch street the first grocer to sell tea in England, whose concern survives under the name of Davidson, Newman & Co. The identical sign of three sugar loaves that hung over Rawlinson's shop adorns the present establishments. There too may be seen the cannisters and scales dating from the seventeenth century. Dan Rawlinson charged his customers \$15 a pound for tea.

TO MODERNIZE PALESTINE.

It is reported that British capitalists are planning to modernize Palestine if the Allies succeed in taking it from the Turks. Trolley lines and comfortable hotels are on the programme, and it is thought that the Zionist movement may receive a great impetus if an enlightened administration of the Holy Land is secured. The country under the new regime might afford a welcome refuge to thousands of Polish Jews whose homes have been destroyed during the conflict.

UNITED STATES EMIGRATION EXCEEDS IMMIGRATION.

For the first time in the history of the United States emigration is exceeding immigration, says the London Financier. Up to the end of October each month's movement had shown a net gain on the operation. In November 5,400 more departed than arrived. In December 15,000 more went out than entered, and in January 10,000 more left than were admitted. That tendency seems to have continued in February. The heaviest emigration has been to Southern Italy. This is presumably due to the calling up of Italian reservists to the colors.

A STEAMSHIP TRUST IN RECEIVER'S HAND.

The International Mercantile Marine Company has passed into the hands of a receiver. This Trust included the White Star Line, and its present difficulties are partly due to the loss of the Titanic, the pride of the White Star Line. The loss of this vessel left behind it claims aggregating about \$8,000,000 for personal damages and loss of life and property.

But it was the war that gave the final blow to the Trust. The temporary embarrassment which renders the corporation unable to pay the interest on its bond issues is due to the blighting effects of the war on ocean passenger traffic. Ships whose passenger capacity is normally from 400 to 500 are now content if they can carry 120, and there is no advance booking. In addition many of the corporation's ships have been requisitioned by the British Government for war purposes. Although the line will receive reimbursement for the services of these vessels, the compensation will not equal the amount which would have been earned in the carrying of freight and passengers. The Olympic, taken over by the British Government for a troop transport ship, is now tied up in England. The Oceanic, converted into a cruiser, was wrecked on the north coast of Scotland. Reimbursement for this loss to the steamship company will be some time in coming.

All this at the expense of Austria. If Servia gets what she wants and Roumania secures Bukovina and Transylvania while Istria goes to Italy and Russia takes over Galicia, Austria will look like a plucked turkey and Servia will be at least in the second class of European powers.
