"It is reported from a Dutch source that German submarines have been ordered to sink every American vessel sighted, especially passenger liners, without regard for loss of American life, in order to demonstrate the absolute impotence of the United States."

London, April 30.—Serious rioting has occurred during the past few days at Trieste and Austrian seacoast towns, according to mail advices from Budapest received by the Post. The disturbances have been due largely to a further increase in food prices and a scarcity of flour, resulting from large military requirements.

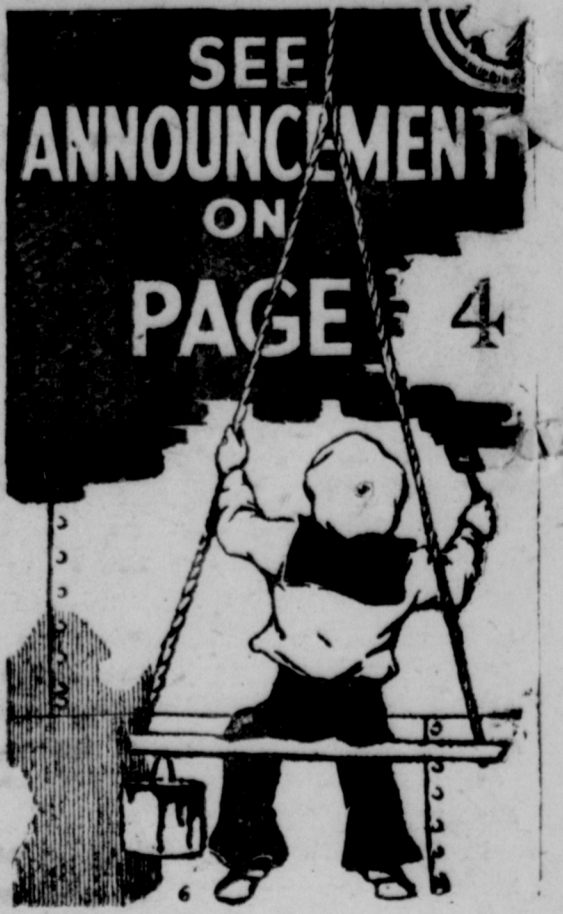
