### Earl Greys Voyage To Archangel.

Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 26 .- A letter received in Winnipeg from a member of the crew of the Dominion governmen ice-breaker Earl Grey, sold to the Russian overnment, tells of the voyage across and of entry into Archange harbor through a field of ice ten inches thick. When rounding the Norwegian coast, the Earl Grey was chased by a German cruiser which she eluded by her 20-knot speed, as she crashed through the ice into her new home port. A great welcome was accorded the ship and later religious service was performed on her decks by the Bishop of Arch angel and a purse of gold divided among her crew.

When the letter was written she had maintained an open channel without paid. much difficulty. Two Canadian Marconi operators and one petty officer remained in the Russian service, the other members of the crew returning.

### Carnage Was Terrific on Garman Warships.

(Special Cable D spatch to The Giobe)

Elinburg, Jan. 30.-Matter which is printed by The Scotsman this morning throws a new light upon the sever ty of last Sunday's battle in the North See. Strong testimony as to the terrible and deadly character of the British gunnery is afforded in the composition of the large body of German prisoners. Practical y every large vessel and most of the smaler vessels of the raiding equadron are represented in the men rescued. In every case their experiences were the same as those of the survivors of the Bucher.

H rrified by the carnage on board their ve sels, scores of men leaped overboard and were rickel up. Their ships, swept by shot and she I fro a the British guis were unfic towards the end to do more than trust to their engines taking them out of the action.

The experences of these men confirm the statements that the large German vessels and many of the smaller ones sustained damage which will keep them off the sea for a long time. Indeed, it i questionable if some will ever ap pear again.

The loss of life on board was so grant and the scenes during the action were so terrifying that the men regarded the ships as decined, During the transference of a batch of prisoners from the British ships t, he shore one lost his reason and leaped overboard, but was promptly rescu d.

Berlin, Jan. 29 -The report that the Guman cru ser Kolberg was sunk in the battle in the North Sea last Sunday is untrue. Ail the German ships with the exception of the Bucher have aeturned.
