Fiendish Work of Anarchists.

New York, March 2.—An attempt to blow up St. Patrick's Cathedral with a bomb this morning and the arrest of two men by detectives, who had been informed for months of their activities, was followed by an announcement made at police headquarters that the arrests had balked an anarchist plot to kill Mr. Andrew Carnegie, Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Mr. John D. Rockefeller, jr., and other wealthy men with bombs. Thereafter the anarchists, according to the police, were to inaugurate in New York city a reign of terror comparable only to the days of the French revolution.

It was part of the plot, the police assert, for gangs of men armed with rifles and revolvers to appear simultaneously in various parts of the city to shoot and to pillage; the biggest banks

The Public Utilities Commission met Thursday in the Court House to hear the application of the Woodstock Electric Light and Power Co for permission to charge a minimum rate of 75 cents a month to users of electric light. A. B. Connell, a member of the board, took no part, being a user of the company's light. J. C. Hartley was present for the town and F. B. Carvell represented the company. It is thought that the request will be granted. Chas. H. Wright, of Halifax, James S. Creighton, Gordon Bailey and C. D. Johnston, gave evidence for the company. On behalf of the Town Council J. C. Hartley requested that the commissioners order the company to guard against violation of pressure of voltage, and to show its readiness to serve at all hours.
