New York, March 2 .- An attempt to blow up St. Patrick's Cathedral with a bomb this morning and the arrest of two men by detectives, who had been informed for months of their activities, was followed by an announcement made at police headquarters that the arrests bad balked an anarchist plot to kill Mr. Andrew Carnegie, Mr. John D Rockefeller, Mr. John D. Rockefeller, jr., and other wealthy men with bombs. Thereafter the anarchists, according to the police, were to inaugurate in New York city a reign of terror' comparable only to the days of the French revolution.
