TOWN COUNCIL

to better advantage; this was agreed to rather than give a bonus, and the company paid all the expenses and all the bonds with the exception of one which will be due next month. After that is paid the company owing to the strip-gency of the money market may ask a similar favor and as the firm employs some 75 men it would be necessary to consider the matter now so that notice of legislation could be given in time to have the bill presented at next session of the Legislature.

Moved by Couns. Noddin and Smith and passed that a committee of three members, as well as the mayor and clerk, be appointed to consult with Mr. Dickinson on the matter.

The finance committee was appointed. Moved by Couns. Leighton and Fewer and passed that if the committee so decide, it has power to instruct the clerk to have the notices published in the newspapers.

Mr. Hartley said he went to St. John on Tuesday, attended the meeting of the Utilities Commission on Wednesday morning and after Messrs Carvell and Bailey had been heard for the Power Co. he asked the commission to meet in Woodstock to give the people a chance to protest against the proposed minimum rate of 75 cents a month if they so desire. The commission fixed the date on Feb. 25, at 10.30 a. m., in the grand jury room, Woodstock, and all citizens have a right to appear.

After the matter was thoroughly debated the report was received.

Moved by Coun Fleming, seconded by Coun Young, that the clerk be requested to appear before the commission to safeguard the interests of the citizens, and that the mayor appoint a committee to advise the clerk on the subject.

Coun Leighton felt that definite instructions should be given the clerk at this meeting and moved in amendment that the clerk appear before the Utilities commission and ask the commission if they think it advisable to grant the minimum rate, what hours the Power Co. will furnish the light and what difference in voltage will be allowed.

Amendment was defeated and the original motion carried.

The mayor appointed Couns Young, Leighton and Smith said committee.

Coun Fleming moved a resolution that the Arrostok Falls Power Co. A. R. Gould president, be allowed to enter the town to furnish power in conformity with communications that had passed between Mr. Gould and the Town Council during the past two years.

Coun Smith read a communication from the Arrostok Falls Power Co., showing that during the dry season last summer they had a lot of water going to waste.

Coun Flemming and other councillors spoke to the question.

Coun Noddin thought that the matter should be studied at once. The Councils of the last two years did nothing but postpone the matter. It was time for this Council to act, or Mr. Gould would probably get Legislation to enable him to enter the town without the consent of the Council and without concessions.

Mayor Sutton said he felt he should say a word on the subject. The council should make a start at once. He did not wish to criticize the other Councils, but they had played with the proposition for nearly two years. There was no desire to bring in an opposition company, but he was actuated in his course in the interests of all the citizens. Over 90 per cent of the citizens would vote for resolution as presented by Coun. Flemming.

Coun Leighton wanted the information and the correspondence that had passed between Mr. Gould and the town clerk during the past two years.

Moved by Coun Leighton, seconded by Coun Fewer that the matter be referred to a committee to report upon at next meeting.

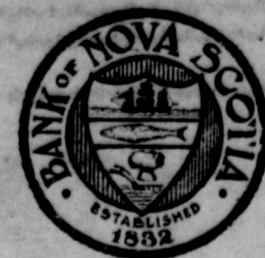
Coun Young would vote for the resolution, but it was only necessary to have a simple motion stating that the Council was favorable to the Goud Company entering into the town. All the concessions and details could be entered in the contract, binding on Mr. Goud or any company that may succeed the present Arrostok Falls Company.

Amendment was lost and original motion carried, yeas Couns Noddin, Smith, Flemming and Young, nays, Coun Leighton and Fewer.

The Council then adjourned.
