**PREVENTIVE FOR CAKE STICK-**  
**ING.**

If you, who use paper in the bottom  
of your cake tins, sometimes have  
trouble in removing the same from  
cake, try brushing the paper lightly  
with water after removing cake from  
tin. The heat of the cake will cause  
steam and the cake will come off quick-  
ly.

HOUSEHOLD

SHOSHONE BAKED APPLE.

For each cored and pared  
apple allow one scant teaspoon  
honey and a bit of butter. Put  
the honey in the cavity and the  
butter on top. Arrange the ap-  
ples in a deep baking dish  
which will just hold the number  
to be baked. Pour on enough  
boiling water to come half way  
up on the apples. Cover closely  
and set on top of the stove. Boil  
about ten minutes, or until the  
apples begin to look clear. Then  
remove cover and finish by bak-  
ing until done in the oven. The  
secret is in boiling the apples  
first, which makes them puff up  
when baked, instead of shrink-  
ing. If honey is not at hand  
sugar can be used, though it is  
not so rich.

FINE DOUGHNUTS.

Two eggs, one cup sugar, one-  
half teaspoon salt, one-quarter  
teaspoon nutmeg, one quarter  
teaspoon lemon extract, one cup  
sweet milk, one cup mashed  
potatoes (mashed very soft and  
creamy), three teaspoons baking  
powder and about a quart of  
flour. Add a pinch of ginger to  
keep them from soaking fat.  
Fry in hot fat. I think they  
keep soft longer from adding the  
mashed potatoes.

IDEAL SPONGE CAKE.

Beat four eggs very light;  
then beat in a little at a time,  
two cups of sugar. Add one cup  
of sifted flour, a little at a time,  
then another cup of flour in  
which two teaspoons of baking  
powder have been mixed. Last-  
ly a scant cup of hot water. Stir  
in a little at a time. Flavor with  
lemon.

BAKED NEW BEETS.

Wash and scrub new beets,  
cut off the stem ends, place  
beets in a pan containing a little  
hot water to keep them from  
sticking, and bake till tender in  
a moderately hot oven from 45  
minutes to an hour. Cool, re-  
move skins, and serve seasoned  
with butter, salt and pepper.

QUICKLY MADE CAKE FIL-  
LING.

When in need of a cake filling  
and there is little time, take the  
white of an egg, beat to a  
froth, add half a cup of sugar  
and one cup of crushed straw-  
berries, raspberries or jam, con-  
tinue beating until like thick  
cream. This is truly delicious  
and will not soak in.

TO REMOVE BLACK.

The grease and dirt which will ac-  
cumulate on the zinc under the range;  
near the legs; can be easily removed  
by using kerosene and soap-suds.

It has seven levels, and the low-  
est is nearly a thousand feet deep.  
It is entered by eleven shafts. The  
different levels are connected by  
flights of steps hewn out of the  
rock salt. In the mine are chapels,  
tramways, a railway, a railway  
station, a ballroom, and several  
other halls, all hewn out of the  
rock salt with elaborate architec-  
tural decoration.

There are sixty-two miles of  
pony tramways and twenty-two  
miles of railway. All these lines,  
and the principal passages, or  
"streets," meet in a sort central  
cavern. Here is the central rail-  
way station, with spacious wait-  
ing rooms and an excellent refresh-  
ment room. It looks, according to  
one visitor's description, "more  
like a summer pavilion than a rail-  
way station, with its latticed gal-  
leries and its rows of stately pil-  
lars gleaming white and irides-  
cent."

The oldest "building" in the  
mine is the Chapel of Saint Antho-  
ny; it dates from 1691. It con-  
tains three altars, a pulpit and  
much statuary, all elaborately car-  
ved out of rock salt. But services  
are now held in the modern but  
equally elaborate Chapel of Saint  
Cunigunde, which is entered by  
descending forty-six salt steps.  
The chapel is fifty yards long, fif-  
teen yards wide, and thirty feet  
high, and is used regularly for  
worship.

The ballroom is a huge room,  
where the miners often hold their  
festivals. A miners' orchestra  
plays regularly in the hall, not  
only for the dances, but for the en-  
tertainment of visitors. The mine  
has been worked for at least eight  
hundred years. It belongs to the  
Austrian government, and gives  
work to one thousand men.
