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HOUSEHOLD

SALMON FRITTERS.

Grind one-half cup of any ordi-
nary salmon, add two ground
crackers, two eggs, one-half tea-
spoon of salt, one-half cup of
sweet cream. Mix together
thoroughly. Make these fritters
very thin and put on a hot, well-
greased pan to fry. Brown nice-
ly on both sides.

STRAWBERRY CONSERVE.

Two quarts strawberries, one
pineapple, five pounds sugar,
one pound raisins, two oranges,
one quarter pound nuts. Cook
all slowly until thick and pour
in glasses.

TAPIOCA AND PEACHES.

Soak one cup of tapioca in one
pint of water overnight. Use a
quart can of peaches. Put a lay-
er of peaches in your baking
dish, then a layer of tapioca,
sprinkling generously with
sugar. Continue in this way un-
til you have used all. Finish by
pouring the juice over. Bake
slowly for two or three hours,
or until the grains are smooth.
Serve with cream.

CHEESE SAVORY.

Prepare some thin slices of
toast. Cover each slice with one-
half inch pieces of good flavored
cheese. Lay in a baking pan and
place an egg carefully in the
centre of each piece. Bake in a
hot oven until the eggs are set.
Season with salt and a dash of
paprika on each.

CHOCOLATE CAKE.

Take a cupful of brown sugar,
add a half cup of sour cream, a
half teaspoonful of soda, one
egg well beaten, a cup and a
half of flour sifted with a tea-
spoon of baking powder. Dis-
solve two squares of chocolate
in half a cup of boiling water
and add to the cake the last
thing. Flavor with vanilla and
bake in two layers.

**Cutworms and How to Fight
Them**

Farmers, market gardeners and oth-
ers who cultivate the soil will be plea-
sed to know that the Entomological
Branch of the Dominion Department of
Agriculture, has issued a 31 paged bul-
letin (No. 10) on "Cutworms and their
Control," prepared by Mr. Arthur Gib-
son, Chief Assistant Entomologist. In
the introduction it is stated that cut-
worms as a class rank in importance
with such well known pests as the San
Jose Scale, the Codling Moth and the
Hessian fly, all of which are among our
most destructive insect enemies. There
are certainly few insects which, year

after year, inflict such widespread dam-
age as the various caterpillars known
commonly as cutworms. The annual
loss occasioned by these insects in Can-
ada amounts to hundreds of thousands
of dollars. In the bulletin the methods
of controlling cutworms are discussed
fully. Under "Preventive Measures"
the value of clean cultivation is refer-
red to as well as the placing of bands of
tin or paper around plants which are
set out. "Remedial Measures" in-
clude descriptions of various poisoned
baits to destroy the cutworms, direc-
tions for the making of proper furrows
or ditches to prevent the advance of
armies of cutworms, etc. Fifteen com-
mon kinds of cutworms are described
in popular detail and much information
given on the habits and life-history of
the various species.

The bulletin is fully illustrated, the
figures being clear and well chosen.
Altogether there are 20 illustrations
of cutworms, cutworm moths, injury
to plants, etc. Copies of this new pub-
lication may be had free of charge on
application to the Chief of the Publi-
cations Branch, Department of Agricul-
ture, Ottawa. Enquiries regarding

Zeppelins Must be Protected

Basel, Switzerland, June 22, via Paris
June 23.—Despatches reaching here
from Germany set forth that a meet-
ing of aerial experts was held recently
at Friedrichshafen to discuss the ques-
tion of constructing on top of all Zepp-
lin airships launched in the future a gun
platform on which to mount machine
guns. These would be used to drive
away enemy aeroplanes and protect
the Zeppelins from attacks such as that
delivered over Belgium by the British
aviator Warneford.

The opinion was expressed to this con-
ference that Warneford had exploded
the theory of Count Zeppelin that his
airships cannot be approached and at-
tacked by aeroplanes.

Another message reaching here from
Germany says that Emperor William,
when he heard of the death of Aviator
Warneford, said: "He was a brave en-
emy."

**Fishing in Galilee in Ages
Past and Present**

Most of the fish that abound in the sea
of Galilee nowadays, as they did 2,000
years ago, are a species of bream and
chub. A canning factory, I am told, is
now in process of erection on the shore
not far from Capernaum. These fish
were formerly taken almost wholly in
nets, though fishhooks seem to have been
known and used more or less throughout
the East from very early times. Wil-
kinson tells us that angling was a favor-
ite pursuit of the wealthy in Egypt, as
well as of the poor who could not afford
a net. Something like our modern weirs
were also in vogue, but in Gennesaret
they were expressly forbidden by law,
in Bible times. Fly fishing was un-
known until a comparatively recent
period.
