HOUSEHOLD

COOKED RADISH.

Did you ever try cooking radishes that have grown too large to be tasty as a table radish? Cook and serve as you would new turnips, and unless the radishes have been in the ground entirely too long you will find them of even finer flavor, as well as several weeks in advance of turnips.

LEMON PIE.

Yolks of three eggs well beaten, one cup sugar, one tablespoon corn starch, juice and grated rind of one lemon. Mix thoroughly and add one-half cup boiling water, stirring constantly. Pour in rich crust and bake until thick. For meringue: Beat whites of three eggs stiff, add two teaspoons sugar. Pour over pie and bake until a golden brown.

BUTTERCUPS.

Make a boiled icing and spread upon graham or oatmeal crackers, and if desired sprinkle with chopped nuts. A little leftover icing from a cake will spread several crackers and form a treat for the children.

Eight or ten marshmallows cut in pieces and added to boiled icing just after the sugar has been turned over the eggs, greatly improves the icing, and makes it less liable to grain.

CORN MUFFINS.

One-half cup cornmeal, one tablespoon melted butter, one cup flour, one-half teaspoon salt, three teaspoons baking powder, three-fourths cup milk, one tablespoon sugar, one egg. Mix dry ingredients; add with beaten egg and melted butter. Put in buttered muffin tin and bake twenty to thirty minutes in hot oven.

HOW TO MAKE VINEGAR.

Fourteen pounds of dark brown sugar, ten gallons of soft water, two yeast cakes dissolved in one cupful of warm water and two slices of toasted bread. Boil sugar in one-third of the water and skim. Remove from the fire, add cold water, strain into a keg, stir with a stick every day for a week; then tack a gauze over top of the keg. Put in a warm place for six months, when it is ready for use.

THE VALUE OF A QUART OF MILK.

Farm and Fireside says:

"When you sell a quart of milk for 7 cents you are giving more food for the money than the buyer can get in most other forms. It is twice as cheap as mutton or fresh fish, six times as cheap as dried beef, nearly three times as cheap as beef chuck, 40 per cent cheaper than pork loin, three times as cheap as beef sirloin, nearly three times as cheap as eggs. The staples that cost less in proportion to food value than milk are such things as potatoes, rice, dates, cornmeal, prunes, cheese, wheat, bread, and beans. The above figures will hold good in the average interior regions of the nation."

Pour on the sink about a tablespoonful of kerosene, then wipe with the paper. A sink cleaned in this way is free from grease. It is glossy and sheds the water. Therefore it does not rust easily.

HOW TO KEEP THE KIT-
CHEN PAINT BRIGHT
AND CLEAN.

Kitchen paint will soon acquire a shabby, dull look from the frequent cleaning that is necessary in this room. The use of soap only increases the difficulty, especially if the paints are varnished. A good plan is to boil one pound of bran in a gallon of water for an hour, then wash the paint with this bran water. It will not only be kept clean but bright and glossy.

HOW TO KEEP BREAD,
CHEESE AND CAKE
FRESH.

Keep cheese in a cool, dry place, and after it is cut wrap it in a linen cloth and keep it in a tight tin box.

Keep bread in a tin covered box and it will keep fresh and good longer than if left exposed to the air.

Cake also should be kept in a tight tin box. Tin boxes with covers like trunks, with handles at the ends, are best for bread and cake.
