Coun Leighton - Eigineer Barbour's report called for 600 feet of wells;: we thought that about 200 feet would do; we went some 300 feet below the barn on Connell Park, and went down until we struck hard pan; next about 100 feet below that spot, we drilled 47 feet until we struck fine sand; next, some 150 feet below that spot near the end The 12th Day of October of the island, we struck blue clay; coming toward the head of the island, we drilled until we struck rock at 62 feet. In any of these wells there are over 40 feet of water. We are trying to get pure water, and the two upper terms we could.
