CUCUMBER SANDWICHES Cut white bread very thin and trim the edges Spread thin with slightly warmed butter. Sprinkle each slice with a light dash of sweet paprika and salt. Put in a very thin filling of finely sliced cucumber and sprinkle with a little grated cheese. Cut each sandwich diagonally and serve.

LETTUCE AND PARSLEY SANDWICHES.

Trim the edges of thin slices of white bread. Butter lightly. Carefully wash and dry some crisp lettace leaves. Finely chop the parsley, spread each slice with a little mayourise dressing. sprinkle with the chopped parslev, add the lettuce leaves and serve.

COTTAGE CHEESE SAND. WICHES.

Cut very thin slices of rye bread that is a day old. Butter lightly and spread with a thin with salt, sweet paprika and some finely chopped ripe olives, Trim away the crusts and serve, CHEESE AND NUT SAND WICHES.

Slice Boston brown bread very thin and lightly butter. Sprinkle very lightly with salt and spread with a thin layer of cream cheese. Cover the cheese with a light layer of finely chop ped nuts and serve after trimming away a thin crust.

MOSAIC SANDWICHES.

RHUBARB TAPIOCA.

Wash and cut into small pieces one quart rhubarb. Cook it with one pint sugar in a porcelain or granite double boiler until tender; do not stir it. To the syrup left in the double boiler, add enough boiling water to make one quart and when boiling add two-thirds of a cup of pearl tapioca. Let it boil one hour, then pour it over the rhubarb.
