Summer Sandwiches.

CUCUMBER SANDWICHES.

Cut white bread very thin and trim the edges. Spread thin with slightly warmed butter. Sprinkle each slice with a light dash of sweet paprika and salt. Put in a very thin filling of finely sliced cucumber and sprinkle with a little grated cheese. Cut each sandwich diagonally and serve.

LETTUCE AND PARSLEY SANDWICHES.

Trim the edges of thin slices of white bread. Butter lightly. Carefully wash and dry some crisp lettuce leaves. Finely chop the parsley, spread each slice with a little mayonaisse dressing, sprinkle with the chopped parsley, add the lettuce leaves and serve.

COTTAGE CHEESE SANDWICHES.

Cut very thin slices of rye bread that is a day old. Butter lightly and spread with a thin layer of cottage cheese. Sprinkle with salt, sweet paprika and some finely chopped ripe olives. Trim away the crusts and serve.

CHEESE AND NUT SANDWICHES.

Slice Boston brown bread very thin and lightly butter. Sprinkle very lightly with salt and spread with a thin layer of cream cheese. Cover the cheese with a light layer of finely chopped nuts and serve after trimming away a thin crust.

MOSAIC SANDWICHES.

For these sandwiches the bread must be one day old. Use white bread, graham and Boston brownbread. Cut the slices very thin. Lightly butter a slice of the Boston brown bread upon this place a slice of white bread, butter and add a slice of the graham bread. Trim away the crust edges and serve.

RHUBARB TAPIOCA.

Wash and cut into small pieces one quart rhubarb. Cook it with one pint sugar in a porcelain or granite double boiler until tender; do not stir it. Skim it out carefully and put it into an earthen pudding dish. To the syrup left in the double boiler, add enough boiling water to make one quart and when boiling add two-thirds of a cup of pearl tapioca. Let it boil one hour, then pour it over the rhubarb. Add one large tablespoon butter and bake about half an hour. Serve with foamy sauce or with cream.

Frank Holt A Bold Dynamiter

New York, July 7.—Frank Holt the man who shot Mr. J. P. Morgan, lay dead to-day in an undertakers establishment at Hempstead, Long Island and the New York police had in their possession his trunk, containing 134 half-pound sticks of dynamite with which they believe he planned to wreck public buildings in New York and other cities.

An autopsy early to-day established the fact that Holt committed suicide by leaping from the top of his cell door in the Mineola, Long Island jail, while the keeper's back was turned, last night.

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Mr. Walter R. Jones, the Mineola coroner, issued a statement, after an autopsy had been performed by the prison physician. He said: "It came to his death by a compound fracture of the skull, and cerebral hemorrhage, caused, by a fall."

Holt's suicide followed closely upon the discovery of evidence tending to confirm the suspicion that he was Erich Muentzer, the former Harvard instructor, who was accused of poisoning his wife, in 1906. This was the day set for Holt's preliminary arraignment on the charge of shooting Mr. Morgan.

An investigation was in process to-day, to ascertain whether his suicide was due to negligence of any jail official. The shipment to New York of Holt's trunk containing dynamite enough to destroy a city block was also the subject of inquiry. Police officials inspected the cottage at Central Park L. I., where Holt had spent two weeks, conducting experiments in the manufacture of infernal machines and in target practice with a revolver.

It was reported to-day that Holt had told a detective that he had put 50 pounds of dynamite on board a vessel which had since left New York. Wireless stations along the coast endeavored to reach steamers which had left her since June 29th, to warn them of the possibility of an explosion.

Chicago, July 7.—Identification of Frank Holt, assailant of Mr. J. P. Morgan, as Erich Muentzer, the missing Harvard professor, who was suspected of having caused the death of his wife, is made here by Prof. Chester N. Gould, of the University of Chicago.

Prof. Gould in a statement made public to-day, admitted that he has identified Muentzer who was a former student at the University of Chicago, while at Cornell University, last November. He said that he decided for several reasons not to expose the man, as "he seemed to be getting along so nicely and I thought it was better to let well enough alone."

Much Needed Device Announced

New York, July 7.—A London cable to the Tribune says:

According to a famous British scientist, an Englishman has just made a discovery which will revolutionize submarine warfare. He states that the inventor is one of the committee appointed by the Royal Society to deliberate on scientific problems arising from the war.

The invention is an apparatus whereby a submarine can locate another submerged submarine within a radius of twenty miles and keep in touch with it while within the radius.

If the device is successful then henceforth British submarines will be able to run down and fight Ger-

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man undersea craft.

The scientists gave the story as an instance of what scientific men are able to do when attention is concentrated on war problems, predicting that within a few months as the result of Lord Fisher's appointment, as chairman of the naval inventions board, which will include the cream of British scientists, new discoveries will be made which will astonish the world.

This body is intended not merely to investigate inventions submitted from without, but will devote the greater part of its time to seeing what constructive thought on its part science is able to produce.

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
