Chocolate Receipts

Chocolate Syrup.—One and
one fourth pounds of granulat-
ed sugar, one fourth pound of
cocoa, one pint hot water, one
teaspoon vanilla, and a pinch of
salt. Boil two minutes and bot-
tle. One tablespoonful of this
syrup to one cup of hot milk
and cream. This syrup may be
used as a sauce for ice cream.

Chocolate Milk Shake.—One
egg, two tablespoons of choco-
late syrup, two tablespoons of
shaved ice, one egg and two-
thirds of a cup of milk shake
and strain; add nutmeg or cin-
namon to taste.

Swedish Chocolate Meringues.
—These are dainty little cakes,
not confections as most merin-
gues are, because starch sup-
plies part of the egg whites.
Grate two oblong divisions of
chocolate, add half a cup of pow-
dered sugar. Beat the whites
of three eggs to a stiff froth.
Add to the chocolate mixture
and stir in lightly three ounces
of cornstarch. Bake in patty
pans, using a tablespoonful to
each cake. When done and
still hot, brush over the tops
with a tablespoonful of grated
chocolate melted in two table-
spoons of water.

Chocolate Cottage Pudding.—
1 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons mel-
ted shortening, 1 egg, 1 cup
milk, 2 cups flour, 2 rounded
teaspoons baking powder, 3 level
tablespoons cocoa, salt. Mix
the sugar and shortening to-
gether, add beaten egg, milk
and dry ingredients; having mix-
ed the cocoa with the flour and
sifted together with the salt and
baking powder. Bake in a shal-
low pan half an hour. Cut in
squares, and eat with liquid
sauce.

Sauce.—Stir a rounded table-
spoon of flour into a cup of sug-
ar, add a pinch of salt. Pour on
a pint of boiling water and stir
until dissolved. Cook ten min-
utes, take from fire, flavor, and
add three level tablespoons of
butter.

Chocolate Crumbs.—Mix one
cup of stale bread crumbs, one-
half cup of grated unsweetened
chocolate, two tablespoonfuls
sugar, and one-fourth teaspoon-
ful salt. Put in a pan and bake
in a moderate oven until choco-
late is melted and crumbs are
thoroughly heated. Pile on in-
dividual dishes and top with
whipped cream sweetened and
flavored with vanilla.

Health of Animals

Two Bulletins of premier im-
portance have recently been issued
from the Health of Animals branch
of the Federal Department of
Agriculture at Ottawa, of which
Dr. Torrance is the Veterinary
Director General. Both can be
had free on application to the Pub-
lications Branch of the Depart-
ment.

The first, number 17, is entitled
"Enteric Hepatitis or Black-head
in Turkey." Chas. H. Higgins,
B. S. N. V. S., of the Biological
Laboratory is the author. While

usually seen in its most aggravated
and fatal form in turkeys. Dr.
Tieobald Smith, of the United
States Department of Agriculture,
made an investigation in Rhode
Island during 1894 and 1895, but
it was not until 1900 that the first
mention was made of it in the
Experimental Farms Report of
Canada. It has since, however,
been repeatedly reported upon in
the biological laboratories both at
Ottawa and Guelph. Dr. Higgins
says that the losses from the dis-
ease have been enormous, which
supplies excellent reason for a
close study of the Bulletin. "The
extent of these losses," he further
says, "is well indicated by the fact
that two decades ago a single small
island (Block Island) off the Rhode
Island coast, provided two tons of
marketable birds each year.
Five hundred pounds are not avail-
able in the same locality today.

Statements are also current that
in localities in Ontario where ten
carloads were to be had eight years
ago it is now difficult to secure
two carloads. The reason given
for the falling off in production is
the difficulty of rearing stock that
can withstand this infection." This
quotation is sufficient to indicate
the importance of this Bulletin,
which treats of the origin and
course of the disease and of its
prevention and cure. Appropriate
plain and coloured illustrations
add to the value of the publica-
tion.

The second Bulletin numbered
18 has for its title, "Avian Tuber-
culosis", Dr. Higgins, Patho-
logist, and A. B. Wickware, V. S.,
Assistant Pathologist, are the
joint authors. It is hardly neces-
sary to allude to the importance of
checking and suppressing a disease
that affects alike birds, beasts and
man. The authors show that the
complaint can be transmitted by
domestic pets to those who care-
lessly handle them and in the reverse direction.
Details of experiments made at the
Dominion Biological Laboratory are
given in the Bulletin, which also
describes the symptoms, steps in
prevention that can be taken and
remedial treatment that can be ap-
plied.

In both Bulletins poultry breed-
ers and all persons interested are in-
vited to send cases to the Biological
Laboratory, Department of Agri-
culture, Ottawa, for investigation.

To Color Blouses.

When a white silk or crepe de
chine blouse becomes yellow
after much washing it can be
tinted so that it will look like
