SUMMER SALAD.

Take the young shoots of
mustard, tender lettuce, and the
tender tops of green onions;
shred them fine, and pour over
them hot bacon fat with bits of
the cooked bacon. Season the
dish well with pepper and salt,
and add a tablespoonful of vine-
gar. Toss it with a fork to mix
it, and serve it garnished with
slices of hard boiled egg.

RAISIN SANDWICH.

These are good for the chil-
dren. If the paste is kept in a
cool place it will keep good for a
long time. Seed a pound of rais-
ins, pass them several times
through the mincing machine.Mix with the strained juice of
an orange, two tablespoonfuls of
lemon juice, half teaspoonful of
salt, and two ounces of ground
nuts. Press into small pots and
cover down. Spread on slices of
buttered bread in the usual way.

BUTTERSCOTCH PIE.

Line a soup plate with a good
short crust and bake it in a good
oven. Bring a pint of milk to
the boil. Stir in half an ounce of
butter, two tablespoonfuls of
flour, the yolks of two eggs, and
sugar to sweeten to taste. Stir
over a gentle heat until the mix-
ture thickens. Pour into the pre-
pared crust. Whip the whites
of the eggs as stiffly as possi-
ble. Place on the top, and bake
to a golden brown in a good
oven.ORANGE AND RHUBARB
JAM.Remove the rind from eight
sweet oranges. Boil it in water
until it is tender. Drain, scrape
off the white part, and cut the
remainder into narrow strips.
Clear the oranges as much as
possible from any adhering
white pith, break into pieces,
and seed. Cut up four pounds
of rhubarb. Place with the or-
anges in a preserving pan, and
cook over a gentle heat for three-
quarters of an hour. Add four
pounds of sugar and the cut
rind. Boil until the jam sets
when tested in the usual way.

OLYCOOKS.

Cream together two beaten
eggs and one cupful of granulat-
ed sugar. Add two cupfuls of
milk and six tablespoonfuls of
hot lard. Add eight cupfuls of
sifted flour, to which has been add-
ed six tablespoonfuls of baking
powder and one-half of a tea-
spoonful of salt. Roll the mixture
into balls the size of an English
walnut, with a raisin in the centre
of each. Fry them in deep
fat and roll them in powdered
