Dares Berlin by Urging Peace Talk

Berlin, Nov. 29.—The Radical Socialists will make a determined effort to force a discussion of the aims of the war and the conditions of peace when the Reichstag re-assembles, to judge from an important editorial published in the Vorwaerts.

After summarizing the recent references to peace in the House of Lords and the House of Commons, the Vorwaerts says:

"Without direct contradiction by the Government, English politicians have set up as positive peace conditions the giving up by Germany of Belgium, the north of France and Alsace-Lorraine, with no war indemnity from the English. This list, though wholly unofficial is worthy of most serious attention, which should not be confined to mere mention in the press, but should lead to a discussion in the place where free speech still has its home—the German Reichstag.

"If the British speeches are not to remain 'voices in the wilderness,' Parliament must make use of its prerogative to speak so long as the Government prohibits the discussion of the war aims in the press. A wide-open discussion would also be the best means to destroy certain illusions, which Germany's enemies harbor, as to the possibility and prospects of war attrition.

"The more openly and to the point both sides are allowed to talk, the easier it will be to avoid the dangers of war attrition, which is equally great for all the warring countries.
