## Letter

received from John Harmon

Everything is very quiet here just now and we are enjoying life immensely. We have all the comforts that could be expected and more.

There was a funny thing happened on this part of the line a short time ago which I will try and tell you.

One of the Canadians who had just come out from England with some reinforcements was sent from the first line to get some water, he was told he would find it at the ruined farm house a short distance in rear, but by some accident he got in the wrong communication trench (one that had formerly been used by the Germans) after following it a short way, he looked out to see if he was going right, and saw some ruined buildings and a pump, so climbed out to get the water. When he got pretty close to the pump, some one called "Hello Scottie" and when he looked, here was a big German.

The German asked him if he knew where he was and he said no, well said the German you are in our lines, what did you come for. He told the German he was a new man and was sent for water, then the German told him since he had gone so far he might as well get his water and go back, and helped him fill his water bottles, then asked him if he wanted some tobacco, and gave him some German cigarettes and tobacco, then showed him the safest way back to his own lines. The boys at first did not believe his story, but the German cigarettes and tobacco could not be denied.

So we evidently have some good sports even across the line, only last night a voice called out. "I have not got my gun" "I am half way, come and meet

me" I have some beer for you."

At this a Canadian officer told the men not to shoot he was going out. So he got over the parapet found his way in the darkness through the barbed wire and met the German.

He says he did not drink his beer but had a short talk and both went back to their own lines.

There is little or no news here, we are having a good time and tell the slackers there is always room for more.

Moved by Coun. Leighton, seconded by Coun. Flemming, that Patrick Gorey be paid \$200 on account.

Carried.

Coun. Flemming—We are about to crush rock for permanent streets. The Power Company has informed me that it will raise the power \$1.00 a day. We have been only paying \$2 a day for the power to crush rock.

Mayor Sutton—I looks as if you will have to pay the extra money.

Moved by Coun. Leighton, seconded by Coun. Noddin, that the bill from Power Co. be paid at \$384.88, a cut of \$12.48 for lights not burning, and its bill for \$365, for installing new lights, will be paid when approved by the chairman of committee.

Mayor Sutton reported that \$157 were collected in licenses so far this year.

Moved by Coun. Young, seconded by Coun. Noddin, that former Night Watch Brewer be paid \$30 on account of salary for August, the balance to be paid when the question of uniform be settled by Coun. Fewer, chairman of police committee.

Moved by Coun. Leighton, seconded by Coun. Young, that the present night watch be requested to procure his policeman's suit on his own account, and the money refunded to him if he remains on duty until the end of the year.

Carried.

On motion of Coun. Noddin the salaries falling due were ordered paid.

Coun. Leighton—Has the Imperial Packing Co. filed its insurance papers with the town solicitor as yet.

Coun. Young—The insurance papers are in my possession, the town solicitor being out of town.

It was now only 9.30 and when the motion to adjourn was made, Coun. Leighton humorously said that those frequent midnight sessions were caused, it could be easily seen, by the presence of Couns. Fewer and Smith, who were absent on this occasion, and to no others should the blame be attached.

Adjourned in usual form.
