Moved by Couns. Fleming and Smith that should the McCain Co. come here this month to re-press hay for military purposes the same arrangement be made with the company as was in force last winter. Carried.

Moved by Couns. Young and Leighton that an order be drawn on the treasurer for \$2000 in favor of the school board.

Mr Hartley called the attention of the Council to the by-law making it compulsory for sleds or sleighs to carry bells and said that citizens were in danger by the law being violated.

Mayor Sutton said that the police officials would see that the by law be enforced.

Coun. Fewer said that Chief Bolger objected to the fire bell being rung as a curfew bell, as he had a right to do, and thought that the town clock, when it struck nine, would have to do as a warning.

Coun. Smith was given permission to buy a car load of wood for fire purposes.

Coun Noddin objected to holding a meeting in December to pay the December bills. The salaries would not be due at that time. His department had already paid bills for twelve months and even more. He would have a credit balance, but if they asked him to pay accounts for thirteen months he might not have. He promised to bring his department out square and he had done so.

It was decided to hold the regular meeting in January, unless something unforeseen happens when the meeting will be called by the chair.
