TOWN COUNCIL.

A special meeting of the Town Council was held on Monday night, August 23, the members of the board being present with the exception of Coun. Young.

The Mayor explained that the meeting was called to consider the tenders for and make an appointment to the office of superintendent of the water works, the term of A. G. Fields expiring on Sept. 1st.

Coun Leighton submitted the different tenders and reported that the majority of the committee recommended the reappointment of Mr. Fields at \$850.00 with \$100.00 extra if he acts as superintendent of streets.

Moved by Coun Leighton, seconded by Coun Fewer, that a contract be entered into with Mr. Fields at the above figures. Lost.

Moved by Coun Smith, seconded by Coun Noddin, that the position be given to Charles Burpee at \$790.00, with \$100.00 added if he acts as superintendent of streets. Carried.

Yeas—Coun Smith, Noddin and Flemming. Nays—Coun Fewer and Leighton.

Coun Leighton moved, Coun Smith seconding, that the pure water committee be authorized to have wells drilled on Connell Park as requested by Engineer Barbour, to see if the quantity of water can be found there.

The Major said that a similar motion had been defeated by a full board at the last meeting, and it was hardly fair to bring it up again in the absence of Coun Young.

Coun Noddin said he was strictly opposed to prospecting for water this year. He thought the motion should be ruled out of order. He would be willing for the committee to spend what money it had on hand, but no more.

Carried. Yeas, Leighton, Smith and Fewer. Nays, Flemming Noddin.

Coun Leighton gave notice that he would move a by-law at next meeting forbidding children under 14 years of age to be on the streets after nine o'clock at night.

G. Murray Anderson.

On Wednesday, August 18th, Ernest L. Ingraham passed away at Dr. Prescott's private Hospital. Deceased was a son of Mr and Mrs Geo. S. Ingraham of Southampton, N. B. and was in the twenty-second second year of his age. On the Friday previous to his death he was operated on for appendicitis and good hopes were entertained for his recovery, but later a complication of other diseases rendered his condition more serious and at 11. 10 p. m., on Wednesday he passed away. His father and mother were at his bedside the last day of his life. Rev M. H. Manuel of Florenceville who was in Woodstock visiting at the home of LeBaron Ingraham, brother of the deceased, visited him on Wednesday and was with him when the end came. The young man expressed a firm faith in the Saviour and willingness to abide by the will of God.

His body was taken to his home in Southampton on Thursday and funeral was held on Saturday morning.

Services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Manuel and Rev. Frank Baird. Previous to the burial the remains were taken to the Baptist church where Rev. Mr. Manuel preached from John 3: 14, 15, "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness even so must the son of man be lifted up, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have eternal life." The large attendance at funeral testified to the deep sympathy of the community for the bereaved family. Besides his sorrowing parents, deceased leaves five brothers and five sisters; this being the first break in the family circle.
