Military Chiefs in Council

Paris, Aug. 27.—Field Marshal Joffre, Lord Kitchener, Gen. Foch and several other army chiefs, held an important military conference on Monday at Chantilly, close behind the lines in Northern France. Great significance is attached to the council.

**HOUSEHOLD**

**CHOCOLATE PIE**

Four tablespoons chocolate, 1 pint boiling water, cook 3 minutes, then take yolks of 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons corn starch, and 6 tablespoons sugar, mix all together and boil till thick. Bake with one crust, beat whites of eggs to a stiff froth for top.

**SOFT GINGER BREAD**

One cup molasses, 2 level teaspoons soda, 1 cup cream or 1/2 cup soft butter or lard and fill cup with boiling water, 1 beaten egg, a pinch of salt, 1 small teaspoon ginger and 2 heaping cups sifted flour. Beat smooth, but not too much, as that lightens the color. Bake in moderate oven.

**CREAM CAKE**

One cup sugar, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 egg, beat these together, then add 1 cup milk, 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder in flour, then add flavoring, bake in layer tins.

**CHOCOLATE FILLING**

Two large tablespoons cocoa or grated chocolate, butter size of egg. Melt these together, then add 3 tablespoons cold coffee and enough powdered sugar to thicken.

**GRAHAM CAKE.**

One cup sugar, 1-2 cup butter, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 2 1/2 cups graham crackers rolled fine, 1 teaspoon baking powder, flavor. Any kind of filling between layers.

**TOMATO SAUCE**

Two quarts chopped or ground tomatoes, 4 tablespoonfuls chopped ground onions, 1 1/2 cups celery (cut in small pieces), 1 tablespoon cayenne pepper, 1/2 teaspoonful ground cloves, 1-2 teaspoonful ground cinnamon, 1 teaspoonful grated or ground nutmeg, 6 tablespoonfuls sugar, 4 tablespoonfuls salt, 6 tablespoonfuls mustard seed, 1 1/2 cups vinegar. Mix without any heating and place in jar in cool, dry place; will keep a year without sealing

**Household Hints.**

**Sealing Catsup Bottles.**

When making catsup try tying waxed paper over the necks of the bottles tightly, then dip the tops in melted sealing wax. Your catsup will keep splendidly, besides the paper is more satisfactory than corks.

**Catching Mice.**

It may be that some housewives are bothered with mice and are tediously baiting traps and placing them at points where the mice have been working. By locating the hole where the rodents made their entrance into the room and then placing an unbaited trap with the trigger end tight against the baseboard or wall they will be caught nearly every time.

**Removing Scorched Spots.**

If a piece of white goods is scorched while ironing it the discoloration can be immediately removed by rubbing over it a cloth dipped in diluted peroxide.

**Removing Hot Dish Marks.**

To remove these marks from furniture take equal parts of linseed oil and turpentine, rub on the wooden top. This removes the white stains. Where the surface is highly polished try a thin solution of olive oil and salt, spreading it over the mark left. Leave it there for one hour before polishing with a dry cloth.

**Roumanian Step For War Sept. 14.**

London, Aug. 24.—A dispatch from Cologne quotes the Cologne Gazette as reporting that the railways of Roumania have received orders to place all rolling stock at the disposition of the Minister of War on Sept. 14.

A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. from Amsterdam says:

"A Wolff Telegraphic Bureau Association dispatch from Berlin states that the Bulgarian Government has informed the Bulgarian minister at Berlin that Bulgaria's negotiations with Turkey have come to an end.

"The Vossische Zeitung infers that the stern agreement has actually been reached. Other papers state that if an agreement has been reached it deals only with the rectification of the frontier and contains no political clause bearing on the war."

A Reuter dispatch from Nish says: "It is not expected the Serbian reply to the proposals of the Entente Allies will be delivered for two or three days. The Government has encountered considerable opposition, but it is understood will be able to overcome the objections offered and agree, with certain reservations, to the proposals of the Entente Powers."

"A final decision will be reached to-morrow at an extraordinary council of ministers at which King Peter will be present."

The first factory for the manufacture of British violins has been established in London and employs none but disabled soldiers and sailors.

The Philadelphia Board of Education did not permit its usefulness to cease with the conclusion of the school year, for it arranged for summer work for school boys on a large scale. By co-operation with grangers in Pennsylvania the Board received information of many opportunities for work on the farms during the summer months and placed many city boys upon the farms affording them healthy and remunerative work during vacation.
