Nomination of Candidates to be filed with the Parish Clerk or to be left at his residence at or before six o'clock p. m. on Monday, the 4th day of October next.

Parish Clerk to post names of Candidates in three of the most public place in each Polling District on or before Thursday the Seventh day of October next.

Candidates names also to be posted up at the Polling Places before the opening of poll on day of election.

The Parish Clerk or District Clerk (as the case may be) to act as Chair man unless he refuses to serve, or is absent, or not competent by reasons of relationship of candidate, when chairman to be chosen by electors present.

Assessors are required to furnish Parish Clerks with list of electors.

Rev. George E. Orser

Rev. George Elijah Orser, for 41 years a well known ordained minister of the Primitive Baptist denomination, died at the home of his daughter Mrs. William F. Cogswell of Fort Fairfield, Wednesday, Sept 29th, at 2:15 p. m. aged 82 years and one month. He had been sick since the first of July.

At the late home, on the Center Lime stone road, at 10:00 o'clock Thursday morning is held a short prayer service over the body, which will be taken on the 1:14 train of the C. P. R. to Lower Wakefield, N. B., where, in the Primitive Baptist church, in which he had preached so many times, will be held the funeral at 10:00 o'clock Friday morning. Interment will be made in Hartland by the side of the mortal portion of his wife.

Mr. Orser was born in Hartland N. B. August 31, 1833, son of the late George W. Orser and Carrie Shaw. A twin brother died in infancy, Mr. Orser never had sisters.

The deceased had lived in Fort Fairfield for 37 years, the last 15 at the home of his daughter Mrs Cogswell. In early manhood he had married Miss Margaret Mallory of Jacksontown, who bore him five children, as follows: Mary, (Mrs Cogswell) and Jane (Mrs. Charles A. Hooper) of Fort Fairfield; Lois, (Mrs Fred Clark) of Boston; Whitfield W. of Maplegrove; David of Mattawan, Michigan.

By a striking coincidence, Mr Orser's death occurred just 12 years after that of his beloved wife, almost to an hour. It may further be remarked here, as an interesting coincidence, somewhat connected with this, that his death was almost precisely 30 years after that of Elihu Cogswell of Pembroke, N. B. father of W. F. Cogswell, Mr Orser's son in-law.

Converted to Christianity at the tender age of nine years, Mr Orser always endeavored to walk as became a Christian, and labored long and lovingly for the cause. Only a few hours before his death, confident and happy in his faith that all would be well with him in the hereafter, he exclaimed in the words of the great apostle: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."
