HOUSEHOLD

BAKED EGGS AND CHEESE.

Six hard cooked eggs, one cup medium white sauce, half tea- spoonful salt, quarter tea spoon- ful pepper, one cup grated cheese Cut the peeled eggs into rather thick slices. Butter a casserole; add layer of sauce, then a layer of sliced egg, then grated cheese. Repeat until the baking dish is full. Place buttered crumbs on top. Bake in a moderate oven until the cheese melts. Variation: One may substitute cooked rice instead of the white sauce.

STRAWBERRY DUMPLINGS

These will require one egg, a cup of sweet milk, a table spoon- ful of melted butter, a heaping tea spoonful of baking powder, and flour enough to make a bat- ter that will be a trifle thicker than that which is commonly used for griddle cakes. Pour a little of this batter into buttered tins, or porcelain cups; place a number of well-sweetened ber- ries in the center and cover them with more batter; then steam for about half an hour. Serve with a sauce made by mashing some strawberries and incorpora- ting them into an ordinary hard butter-and-sugar sauce.

PORK HASH.

Mix together one and one- half cups of chopped ham or shoulder meat, two cups pota- toes, either cooked or raw, and two table spoons of chopped on- ions. Put into buttered baking dish, cover with cracker crumbs, dot with butter and pour over all two cups sweet milk. Bake until nicely browned.

A DAINTY SALAD.

Soak one table spoonful of granulated gelatine in one- fourth cupful of cold water until soft, then dissolve in one cupful of boiling water. Add one- quar- ter of a cupful of sugar, the same amount of vinegar, three table spoonfuls of lemon juice, one t aspoonful of salt, a dash of cayenne pepper and a very little onion juice. When the gelatine is dissolved, strain it, and as it begins to cool, beat it, and as it stiffens, mix one cup- ful of shredded cabbage and one can of pimentos cut fine. Turn into a mold and chill thor- oughly before serving on fresh lettuce leaves with mayonnaise dressing.

CANNED STRAWBERRIES.

To can strawberries so that they will keep their shape and color, after the berries are pick- ed over, put them in a jar, with a layer of sugar and then of berries until all are used. Set them in the cellar over night, and the sugar will penetrate them, and no water must be added; there will be sufficient juice. Have a sugar syrup on the stove hot, put the strawber- ries in and let them boil up gently; then fill the cans with the fruit and juice all cocked to- gether. Screw on the cover, stand the can upside down a few minutes, then turn again changing it in this way until it is cool, and the berries will not rise to the top. This way pre- serves the shape, color, and fla- vor of the fruit.

Britain Orders Twenty Air
ships

New York, June 28.—A new \$500,000 order for flying boats of the type of the America, the great overseas vessel that was construct- ed before the war for a flight across the ocean, has just been placed at Hammondsport, N. Y., by the British government, according to information which reached mem- bers of the Aero Club of America to-night.

The order is for 20 of the giant flying boats at \$25,000 each, and is the largest order for this type of machine that the British gov- ernment has placed since the be- ginning of the war.

According to Henry Woodhouse, manager of the Aero Club, orders for flying machines of various ty- pes, and for motors, which have been placed in America by the belligerent countries, including this newest order, now aggregate about \$7,000,000. European na- tions that are still neutral, more- over, are also beginning to clamor for American aircraft.

The order just placed by Great Britain calls for flying boats with two motors of 100 h. p. each. The original America had three motors, but Great Britain is re- ported to have purchased twelve craft of the type of the America already, and to have found that two powerful motors will answer all purposes and save weight. It will take the Curtis Aeroplane Co. between two and four months to turn out the present order, Mr. Woodhouse said. Each machine will carry four or five passengers and fuel sufficient to last 12 hours. The order stipulates that each ma- chine shall also have enough power to carry one large gun and a quantity of ammunition.

According to information brought here by persons in a po- sition to know the allies are turning out 100 flying machines a week in France and England, and need as many more as they can get.

The Curtiss Company has also built eight flying machines of the land type for the United States government, which were shipped about ten days ago.
