A Good Time for Beekeepers.

Arrangements have been completed for a Grand Field Day and Picnic for the Beekeepers of this section of the Province, on Friday, July 16th.

Mr. Morley Pettit, Provincial Apiarist and Instructor in Beekeeping at the Agricultural College, Guelph, Ont., will be present. At 2 p. m. Mr. Pettit will begin examining the colonies of bees in the yard of the Messrs. Peabody Bros. (located about 11-2 miles below Woodstock on River Road) for contagious and infectious bee diseases. The new Provincial Apiary Inspection Act will be discussed and its provisions and enforcement explained. Those present will be given instructions on how to examine for and recognize the contagious diseases which attack honey bees.

All the various manipulations of the hive and the care and management of bees will be discussed. Questions bearing on all phases of beekeeping will be answered.

Light refreshments will be served. Any wishing to supplement these by bringing along a basket will not offend the committee in charge.

In the evening Mr. Pettit will give an illustrated lecture at the Agricultural School, Woodstock.

All persons interested in Beekeeping are cordially invited and strongly recommended to attend both the picnic and the evening meeting.
