### Canadian Acts Of Heroism

London, Nov. 25.—The following official communication has been received from the Canadian war records officer in France:

"The night of November 20-21 was relatively quiet along that portion of the Somme Ancre front, which is held by our Canadian troops. The new line which we have occupied as the result of our firm advance on the 18th is a strong one. Our pioneers are busy strengthening it still further, and extending the communication trenches. Last night an officer of our sappers was moving up one of these new trenches when he was surprised to meet a party of six Germans, one of them an officer, who had apparently lost their way. He demanded their surrender. They promptly obeyed and he led them all back.

"A splendid example of the heroism of our artillery observation officers has just come to hand. During the battle of the 18th it became necessary to secure a certain piece of vital information as to matters beyond our front. Three of the field observation officers of the Second Artillery Division from three separate points were sent forward through the enemy's barrage to procure this information. It was an undertaking of supreme peril. One of them, Lieut. Oliver, was killed in the attempt. Another officer succeeded and got back with the information, and the third, while yet some way behind the most advanced section of our attack, was severely wounded and fell into a shell hole. As he dragged himself out and started to crawl back, he found himself directly in front of a German machine gun which had emerged from some hiding place and was about to open fire upon the year of our line. He rolled into another shell hole. The fire went over him. He crept off to one side, worked his way to the nearest battery and in spite of his desperate condition was able to locate the machine gun so exactly that it was speedily destroyed with all its crew."

### Department of the Interior— Forestry Branch

#### News Letter 180C Facts about Timber

Business is based upon facts and one of Canada's leading businesses is her forest products industry. The figures showing the increases and decreases in different parts of this industry are given in the bulletins just issued by the Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior covering the calendar years 1914 and 1915. These bulletins are sent to men in the trade but any citizen interested who has not received a copy may receive one free upon applying to the Director of Forestry, Ottawa. The specific bulletins are as follows: Bulletin 58A, lumber, lath and shingles; Bulletin 58B, pulpwood and wood-pulp; Bulletin 58C, poles and railway ties.

## Opposing The Demands of Allies

London, Nov. 29.—The Greek crown council has voted to support the government in opposing the Allies' demands for the surrender of arms and munitions, according to an Athens despatch to Reuter's of yesterday's date. The despatch says this decision was reached after a session of an hour and a half which was presided over by King Constantine.

London, Nov. 29.—According to special despatches from Athens, the greatest uneasiness prevails among adherents of M. Venizelos in the Greek capital, who although reported to be strong in numbers, are virtually unarmed. It is feared serious harm may come to them through some sudden outbreak of rioting.

Rear Admiral du Fournier commander of the allied squadron in Greek waters, made a tour of inspection about the city on Monday morning and observed glaring circles of red paint with which loyalists during the night had marked houses and shops belonging to persons whom they regarded as hostile. The mayor's was one building thus marked.

Admiral du Fournier, the despatches continue, visited the mayor later in the day and spoke of measures proposed for the protection of the supporters of M. Venizelos, particulars regarding which have not been published. It is reported in responsible quarters that the Admiral will occupy Athens if any excesses should be attempted, but that the supporters of the Venizelos party are not satisfied, demanding measures to render excesses impossible.

London, Nov. 29.—A London Times despatch from Athens says Admiral du Fournier, in his audience with King Constantine drew His Majesty's attention to the gravity of the situation. Hopes of a settlement are expressed. The French admiral subsequently visited Venizelos merchants who had been threatened and promised them protection if the designs of the reservists should take place.

Telegrams from Larissa state that reservists resisted the removal of guns at the station, and having seized two of them, dismounted them and conveyed them to the public square, where speeches were delivered and the rioters swore not to allow the guns to be surrendered. The guns were then handed over to the commander of the third army corps, who was likewise sworn not to deliver them. Shots were fired by reservists during this demonstration and when the Venizelist newspapers arrived by train they were burned.

Admiral du Fournier has demanded an explanation of works erected on hills that surround the station. He has been assured that they are not in the nature of fortifications.
