## TEA VALUES

Various people quite ignorant on the subject have for sometime past been endeavoring to discredit the trade in all directions, and to make out that the tea drinker is being exploited all round. As a matter of fact, the tea drinking public is not paying so much in proportion for its tea now with 1s per lb duty as it did when the duty was eightpence. Wonderful value can be had at 2s per lb., and the Government takes 1s. of this, so that with 10d about lowest for fairly usable tea in Mincing lane, it does not leave any enormous profit to the distributor after charges for manipulation &c. have been taken into consideration. It was the 1s. 8d. canister then and the 2s. canister now. The consuming public has suffered far less over its tea than any other commodity in household use, while, as we have before pointed out, competition nowadays is so keen that no distributor can afford to drop the quality. On the contrary, they vie with each other as to which shall put the best teas into the blends. Blending has become a high art and the tea drinking public reaps the benefit. If tea had to be sold from the original packages, as it used to be years ago, nothing like the value could be shown at the money and it would never be twice alike.

## Recruiting Quite Low

For the month of November 261 men were signed on in the province. This is the smallest number who have enlisted in the province in one month since official records have been kept of the New Brunswick enlistments. In comparison with the corresponding month last year when 1,526 men were secured, the record this month is far from encouraging.

Where the men were secured: St. John county, 138; Kings 5, Queens and Sunbury 1, Charlotte 4, York 31, Carleton 13, Victoria 2, Madawaska 2, Restigouche 26, Gloucester 9, Northumberland 9, Kent 2, Westmorland 25 and Albert 3.

too much money; when the present land was bought the Island was not available. Nearly everybody thought that the Island was the proper place.

J. W. Gallagher—I was speaking to Charley Beck and he thought if the Island was selected it might be well to haul the loam, to make the race track, during the winter months.

Coun. Burt—I have listened with interest to the discussion as to the location. We do not appreciate the Island as we should. A few years ago the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows met here and the members thought the Island was the most beautiful spot that any town could possibly have for a sporting resort, and that very few towns or cities in Canada had anything to compare with it. We will certainly make a great mistake if we do not accept the offer of Mr. Connell. Let the Exhibition buildings be built on the Island, and nowhere else, next summer.

Coun. Stevens—Any committee appointed at this meeting would not be legal. Let everyone present attend the meeting of the Agricultural Society tomorrow, join that body, and then let every paid up member vote as to the location.

Fred Creighton—After the present lot had been purchased it was found by many not to be suitable; they said if we only had the Island it would be an ideal spot; now that we have the Island, the question should be solved, as it is the only feasible spot; there is no comparison as to the places. At an exhibition, hundreds of autos will be present, which can be looked after on the Island and they cannot be at the present site.

Geo. True said that an argument against the 'flat' was that visitors could visit the exhibition and need not visit the town, owing to the arrangement of the trains. Consequently the presence of visitors would not be of financial benefit to the town.

A. D. Holyoke said that there would be two streets leading to the society's present grounds. While Bull street might be blocked at times by C. P. R. cars, the most of the visitors would have to come to town and take the street leading from the Meduxnekeag bridge, consequently the merchants would have an opportunity to sell their goods if the visitors are anxious to buy.
