## Good Work by Boy Scouts

The Boy Scouts undertook from the Red Cross the responsibility of collecting the Woodstock contributions toward supplying a remembrance from Canada to every soldier in the Canadian hospitals on Christmas morning.

They divided the town into sections and established a headquarters by permission in the future telephone office, where they had a dial to show the progress that was being made. The rain Saturday morning might have discouraged anyone but a Boy Scout but they went at their house to house canvass going from Upper Woodstock, to the Battery camp, to Grafton and to the lower crossing until with a last parade with torches at night they brought the total up to within two cents of one hundred and twenty two dollars and a few promised contributions still to be added.
