Carleton county boys at the Front are getting their baptism of fire, and evidently passing through the thick of the fray.

On Sunday Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Hanning of Hartland, received a cablegram announcing that their son Edward had been seriously wounded in the hip. He went with the 26th.

Mrs. L. M. Stephenson has received news that her son Edward, who went with the 56th, is in a hospital at Zet re port suffering from shell shock.

Other casualties reported are: Omer L. Shaw of East Coldstream, wounded.

S. Poitras, Grand Falls, wounded. Sergt. Thomas Nason, Debec, wounded.

Gunner Bruce Lovely, son of Mrs. Enoch Lovely, Perth, a member of the 28th Battery under the command of Major Randolph Crockett, is expected home in a few days. During the heavy fighting in June at Sanctuary Wood he was dangerously wounded in the chest by a splinter of a shell which lodged near the spleen in the back. He is being invalided home as unfit for further service.

year he drew \$185.

Coun. Stairs—I think we should have some report how he spent the last \$50.

Coun. Nodden—I am in favor of giving him what he wants, but he should say what he is going to do with it. I don't believe in hiding anything.

Coun. Leighton—We can find out when he makes his report at the end of the year. The police magistrate has paid in \$457 during the year. However I will withdraw the motion at present.

Moved by Couns. Leighton and Nodden, that we make a grant of \$25 to pay for recruiting meeting held in Woodstock.

Carried.

Coun. Smith—The engineer at the pumping station wants an increase of \$10 a month. He now gets \$2 a day with free house, light and fuel, but is on duty 24 hours daily as he sleeps in the station.

Moved by Couns. Smith and Leighton that the increase be granted to take effect October 1st.

Carried.

Moved by Couns. Smith and Nodden that the driver of the town team Ham Johnston be given two weeks leave of absence, the town to supply a substitute.

Carried.

Voted that the street committee be given the power to have the sled repaired.

Moved by Coun. Smith, seconded by Coun. Stairs, and

Resolved—That all the property to be acquired and used by the Dominion Tanneries, Limited, its successors and assigns in the prosecution of its business of manufacturing and tanning leather, including all lands and buildings from which no revenue is derived, be exempted by this Town Council of the town of Woodstock from taxation for a period of ten years from the first day of January, A. D. 1917, next ensuing, provided, however, that should the business cease to be operated for twelve months at any time during said ten years period, and the said company refuse or neglect to pay an amount equal to an assessment for the year of inoperation of the plant according to the valuation of the assessors, then the exemption hereby shall cease and become inoperative; and

Further Resolved—That the town will furnish to the Dominion Tanneries, Limited, water at the rate of five cents per one thousand gallons for a period of three years from the said first day of January, A. D. 1917, payments there fore to be made at the times and in the manner provided by the by laws of the said town; and

Further Resolved—That the said company be granted the use of the sewers at the rate of forty dollars per year, subject to the provisions of the by laws or said town relating to the use of the sewers.

Carried.

The Council then adjourned.
